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January 5, 1971

The Montgomery County School Board met in the School Board Office at 7:30 p.m. on the above date. The following members were present: H. C. Graybeal, Chairman; Albin Sale, H. E. Poff, T. M. Dunkenberger, J. R. Stewart. R. L. Sutphin was absent. Also present were: Supt. Hale, E. L. King, J. E. Earp, B. E. Stevens and G. C. Guilliams.

Meeting opened with prayer by Mr. Poff.

Dr. Martin read a request from the recreation department of Blacksburg for use of Blacksburg High School gymnasium for recreation activities. Moved by Dr. Stewart, seconded by Mr. Sale that the request be granted subject to its being fitted into the schedule by Mr. Hale and Mr. Gray.

Supt. Hale read a letter from the County Council of PTA's urging the School Board to cooperate with the Tutorial Program for Montgomery County.

Supt. Hale read a letter from the Belview PTA remitting a check for \$700. and indicating plans for further development of the playgrounds.

Supt. Hale read a letter from Sandra Atkinson, Secretary of the Alleghany District Combined PTA stating that the PTA passed a resolution requesting that the name of Alleghany District High School be changed to Shawsville High School. Mr. Dunkenberger moved that the school be named Shawsville High School. Mr. Sale seconded the motion. Mr. Dunkenberger moved that the preceding motion be tabled until January 19 in order for everyone to think the matter over. Seconded by Mr. Poff and passed.

Moved by Mr. Dunkenberger that the School Board make hook-ups with Riner, Bethel and Price's Fork water companies and pay them a guarantee of a minimum of \$25 a month at each location, seconded by Dr. Stewart and passed.

Supt. Hale reported on some projects that were underway or had been completed at various schools in the county.

The Supt. reported that it is now near definite that Helping Hand will be abandoned at the end of this school year. If it is to be continued at all, it will probably have to be on a smaller scale and by two or three divisions rather than the ten.

The Supt. reported that it now appears that Federal Funds for the Vocational Units in the two high schools will not be available during this fiscal year or next.

Moved by Dr. Stewart that Blacksburg High School be advertised for bids on January 10 and bids to be opened February 9 at 2:00 p.m. Seconded by Mr. Dunkenberger and passed.

Mr. Earp reported on the Drug Education Program for the County.

Moved by Mr. Poff, seconded by Mr. Dunkenberger that the four high schools' schedules of Extra-Curricular Activities be approved. Motion passed.

The following bills and disbursements were unanimously approved for payment:

Moved, seconded and passed that the Board'go into Executive Session to discuss personnel and property acquisition.

Mr. Hale read a report on Steve Bain, son of Mr. and Mrs. Cleamon Bain of Auburn High. Moved by Mr. Dunkenberger, seconded by Mr. Poff that the boy be expelled for the remainder of the school year in the best interests of the students and school.

Supt. Hale read a letter from Mr. Gray concerning students living in apartments rather than with their parents. The concensus of the Board was that it could not regulate such matters.

Supt. Hale read a report from Mr. Sowder, School Board Attorney; that Blacksburg ordinances did not require that the School Board should build walks and drainage facilities at the Blacksburg HIGh. School property on Patrick Henry Drive.

Mr. Dunkenberger gave a report on a sewer system for Shawsville and the possibilities of hooking the Shawsville Elementary School to it. Mr. Hale was authorized to negotiate with them for the service subject to approval by the Board.

Meeting adjourned at 11:45.

The Montgomery County School Board met on the above date at 7:30 p.m. with all members present. Supt. Hale, Messrs. King, Earp, Stevens and Guilliams were present.

Dr. Stewart moved that minutes for the January 5, 1971, meeting be approved without reading, since each member had received a copy. Motion was seconded by Mr. Sale and carried.

Request of Rev. John R. Meade to use the cafeteria at Elliston-Lafayette School to hold a revival was refused on motion by Mr. Sutphin, seconded by Mr. Poff, and passed unanimously.

The Division of Aeronautics of the State Corporation Commission provides airplane rides for school children when requested. The seventh grade at Margaret Beeks School has requested from them and received authorization for two groups to be given rides on February 10. Parental permission is required and the Superintendent recommended that approval of the School Board be granted. Dr. Stewart moved that the request be approved, seconded by Mr. Sutphin and passed unanimously.

Miss Clara E. Scott, Elementary Supervisor, gave a description of a program to be financed under the National Defense Education Act., for the upgrading of the primary science program in the first three grades. This is a child-centered, child-activity type of program designed to improve curriculum and teaching techniques. Teachers in these three grades would receive intensive training and orientation, and VPI will provide supervision and consultant service. The intensified initial part of the program will extend from spring 1971 through the school year 1971-72, and will includeclife science and physical science.

Mr. Ayers, County Executive Secretary, Mr. Hubble from the same office, and Mr. Phipps, engineer, representing the Public Service Authority were present to describe the proposed sewer system for the Shawsville area, a large part of which would involve both the present schools and the new school. Cost to the School Board would be \$41,500., representing \$16,500. for the new school, and \$25,000. for the old school. There would be a \$300. per month sewer charge for both schools following the initial installation charge. The Board advised the committee that they would consider the matter further and try to take positive action at the first regular meeting of the Board in February.

Mr. Hill of Smithey and Boynton, Architects, presented preliminary plans for Phase II of the building program, involving kindergarten rooms at Price's Fork, Belview and Bether, and new gymnasiums, auditoriums and additional classrooms at Auburn and Alleghany. He stated that the first three mentioned are ready for submission to the State Department of Education.

Dr. Stewart moved that question regarding iname change of Alleghany District High School which was tabled at the last meeting be removed from the table, motion was seconded by Mr. Poff and passed. Mr. Dunkenberger withdrew his motion of Jan. 5.

A study of the School Board minutes has revealed that the name "Alleghany District High School" was never officially given to this school, and that prior to 1952 it was known as "Shawsville High School". Mr. Dunkenberger moved that the Board reaffirm the name of the school as "Shawsville High School", seconded by Mr. Sale and passed.

In view of the fact that this year's juniors have already purchased rings with the Alleghany name, Dr. Stewart moved that they be permitted to carry this name through to graduation, seconded by Mr. Dunkenberger and passed unanimously.

Due to some delay in getting plans and specifications from the printers for use by prospective bidders on Blacksburg High School, the architects have requested that the bid opening be postponed one week, from February 9 to February 16. Mr. Dunkenberger moved that bids for construction of the new Blacksburg High School be received in the School Board office on Tuesday, February 16 at 2 p.m. Dr. Stewart seconded the motion and it was passed unanimously.

Mr. Edward G. Simpson, representing the Montgomery Education Association, invited the Shhool Board to meet with the teachers at their next regularly scheduled meeting on February 18, to discuss their reactions to the Program of Action presented by the Association to the Board at their December meeting. He proposed that the teachers be polled for questions to be presented to the Board members prior to this meeting. It was the consensus of the Board that their budget study had not proceeded far enough to be able to answer any questions thus presented, and reaffirmed their position that they would welcome the presence of representatives of the Executive Board of the Association at study sessions for the budget.

Mr. Hale requested permission of the Board to have a study made regarding the use of a Computer Payroll Service, since this operation has become so large in the office that it will soon be of such proportion that it cannot be handled by the present office staff in addition to their other duties. Mr. Dunkenberger moved that further investigation be made, seconded by Mr. Sale and passed unanimously.

Bids on buses, scheduled to be opened at this meeting, had to be postponed because the new specifications have not been received from the State Department of Education for distribution with the requests for bids.

Operating bills in the amount of \$18,880.37, check nos. 7148 through 7270, were approved for payment on motion by Dr. Stewart, seconded by Mr. Poff and passed unanumously.

There being no further business the meeting adjourned.

The Montgomery County School Board met in regular session on the above date at 7:30 p.m. with the following members present: H. C. Graybeal, Chairman; H. E. Poff, J. R. Stewart, Roy L. Sutphin. T. M. Dunkenberger was absent. Also present were Supt. Hale, E. L. King, B. E. Stevens and G. C. Guilliams.

The meeting was opened with prayer by Mr. Guilliams.

Minutes for the meeting of January 19 were read and approved.

Mrs. Parsons, representing the Blacksburg High School P.T.A., presented a request for the Board to pay the balance of the cost of new stage curtains for that school. Total cost will be \$2725.55, and the P.T.A. will contribute \$1400.00. Examination of the present curtains has shown that they are not fireproof. Mr. Sutphin moved that the Board appropriate the additional amount required for this installation if the funds are available, seconded by Dr. Stewart and passed unanimously.

The Department of Recreation of the Town of Christiansburg has requested the use of the playgrounds at the Christiansburg Primary School and the Weller Baker School for the summer recreation program. The Superintendent recommended that this request be granted. It is understood that the program is to be operated in cooperation with the school under the supervision of the principal. Mr. Poff moved that the request be granted so that prior planning can be started, seconded by Mr. Sale and passed,

Mr. Hale read a letter from J. D. Hopkins, Director, Vocational Education for Radford City Schools, inviting the School Board members to attend the regular dinner meeting of the club on Monday, April 12. He requested that a 15-minute talk be presented, followed by a question and answer period. Dr. Stewart was appointed to give the talk and other members will attend if possible.

Request of the Principal for Blacksburg High School-Science Club to take an educational trip to Washington, D.C. in either March or April, using commercial transportation, was approved on motion by Mr. Sutphin, seconded by Mr. Sale and passed.

Mr. Guilliams reviewed the proposal of the Public Service Authority for providing sewer service to the Shawsville High and Elementary Schools. Mr. Sutphin moved that the Authority be notified of the Board's intention to request funds, either by special appropriation, or by inclusion in the Capital Outlay portion of next year's budget, for \$25,000. to cover cost of the installation at the present buildings. The \$16,500. needed for the new school is to be paid from the present Building Fund. Motion was seconded by Mr. Dankenbergand passed unanimously.

The Superintendent reported that insulation on the electrical conduit which passes under the furnace at Christiansburg Primary School had deteriorated and caused a power failure, but the maintenance staff had been able to install new conduit while school was closed for teachers' work conferences. The total cost may exceed \$1500.00.

The Superintendent reported that he had been in Washington, D.C., the past weekend for a discussion of the National Science Foundation grant which was described by Miss Clara Scott at the last meeting of the Board,

for the improvement of instructional practices in the primary science program. Montgomery County is the only school division in Virginia to receive an NSF grant this year.

The following resolution was unanimously adopted:

WHEREAS, it is required under School Building Regulation 5.22 that adequate supervision of the building construction by a qualified person shall be provided by the owners; and that assurance of this supervision shall be furnished by the local School Board to the State Supervisor of School Buildings prior to approval of the plans and specifications of such construction, now therefore

BE IT RESOLVED that the School Board of Montgomery County hereby gives assurance that it will provide adequate supervision by a qualified person during the construction of School Plant Project No. 60-76A, Blacksburg High School; and School Plant Project No. 60-77A, Christiansburg High School.

Mr. Stevens reported that requests for school bus body and chassis bids had been prepared, and the Board approved receiving of these bids for two 54 and four 66 passenger buses at the March 2 meeting of the Board.

Mr. Hale asked for a special session of the Board to begin a study of teacher salary scales since this comprises 72% of the budget. An informat study session was set for February 9.

The following bills and disbursements were approved for payment:

Operating Fund - \$31,213.06, check nos. 7271 through 7406 1969 School Building Fund - \$46,444.12, check nos. 74 through 78 Textbook Fund - \$1,211.76, check nos. 1468 through 1482 January payroll - \$342,317.33, check nos. 11227 through 11878

Federal Aid Education: Operating Bills - \$988.41, check nos. 2990 through 2997 January payroll - \$13,986.93, check nos. 2956 through 2989

Dr. Stewart raised the question of whether stage curtains in all the schools had been fireproofed. He was informed that the new schools have fiberglass curtains, and that the ones in the older schools had been treated with a fire-resistant substance.

Dr. Stewart inquired about the progress being made on plan drawings for the new elementary schools in Blacksburg and Christiansburg. Mr. Hale reported that he hoped to have a report on this in the near future.

On motion by Mr. Sale, seconded by Mr. Poff, it was voted to adjourn to executive session for the discussion of land, pupil expulsion and personnel.

Moved by Dr. Stewart, seconded by Mr. Sutphin that Ronald Terry Mills, born July 28, 1952, in the best interest and welfare of Blacksburg High School, be expelled permanently from Montgomery County Schools. Motion passed.

The Montgomery County School Board met in regular session on the above date at 7:30 p.m. with all members present. Also present were Supt. R. T. Hale, El. L. King, B. E. Stevens, G. C. Guilliams and J. E. Earp.

Dr. Graybeal, Chairman, opened the meeting by expressing the regret and sorrow of the Board at the tragic bus accident which occurred on this date.

Mr. Stevens, Director of Transportation, described the accident, which involved Bus #66 which transports children to the Belview School on Highway No. 114. The driver, Junior Howard Gardner, has been charged with reckless driving and manslaughter. The bus was struck in the side by a loaded gravel truck, and two children, Susan LaPrade, age 10, and Elizabeth Thomas, age 7, were killed. Seven children were admitted to hospitals and an undetermined number treated at hospitals and released.

The Superintendent was directed to write letters of sympathy to the parents of the deceased, and the following resolution was passed unanimously:

WHEREAS Montgomery County School Board Bus No. 66 was involved in a tragic and fatal accident on Virginia 114 at about 8:30 a.m. on February 16, 1971, and

WHEREAS this accident resulted in the death of Susan Bradley LaPrade and Elizabeth Gail Thomas, pupils in Belview Elementary School, and WHEREAS many other pupils riding in the same bus received injuries of varying degrees of severity, now therefore

BE IT RESOLVED by the Montgomery County School Board sitting in regular session on February 16, 1971, that expressions of gratitude and thanks be extended to all persons, many at this time unknown to the School Board, who did in any way attempt to bring relief and comfort to all of the children involved in the accident as well as their families, classmates and teachers in the Belview School, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the School Board commend the numerous organizations and individuals throughout the New River Valley who responded to the call for help at a very tragic hour.

Minutes for the February 2 meeting were approved without reading, since members had received copies.

Mrs. Parsons, President of Blacksburg PTA, presented a list of items that she requested be placed in next year's budget for improvement at Blacksburg High School. They are as follows: more classroom space, lights for the auditorium, outside lighting at the front and on the parking lot, temporary walkway to the Industrial Arts Building, permanent room divider in the foreign language department, sun screens or awnings for the front windows of the building. She also requested the Board to include every need in the budget before it is presented to the Board of Supervisors instead of presenting only what they feel will be passed. The Superintendent reported that some of the items mentioned were already in the process of correction, and that others would be taken care of as rapidly as pessible.

The Blacksburg Christian Church has requested the School Board to enter into a three or five-year lease of their facilities for use by school pupils. Mr. Hale said he could not recommend this, in view of the fact that it is hoped the new buildings soon to be under construction would relieve the overcrowding to the extent that rental of other facilities would not be needed. The Board instructed the Superintendent to inform the church that it is felt two years is the maximum time the facilities

will be required, and they are not ready to enter a lease for any definite period of time.

A letter was read from Mr. S. S. Obenshain, in which he requested that the next school erected in Blacksburg to require a name be given the name of Kipps, for Misses Florence and Mae Kipps, teachers now retired who taught for many years in the Blacksburg High School, and are very much loved and revered. Mr. Obenshain is to be notified that the Board will take this request under advisement for possible consideration when naming possibilities arise.

Dr. Stewart moved that permission be granted for the 7th grade at Beeks School to take educational trips to Natural Bridge and Lexington during March, and to the Barter Theatre in Abingdon during April. Use of 3 school buses was approved. Motion seconded by Mr. Dunkenberger and passed unanimously.

Mr. Robert L. Mills, Architect, reported that there is a tremendous interest in the bidding for the new Blacksburg High School and he anticipates a very good bid. Mr. Poff moved that the bids be opened on February 25, 1971, at 2 p.m. in the School Board office, seconded by Mr. Sale and passed.

Mr. Mills also reported that he hopes to have preliminary drawings for the new elementary school in Blacksburg at the March 2 meeting of the School Board. The Board members told him they were quite concerned that the plans for the new Christiansburg High School be expedited, and he promised to see what he could find out about this.

On the night of Feb. 11, 1971, some one or more persons gained access to the School Board office building on Junkin Street in Christiansburg, inca manner unknown to the staff at this date. The only evidence of their presence was the forceful and destructive entrance to a four-drawer fireproof file cabinet in the office of the Clerk of the Board and theft of the following funds:

- 1. Textbook money \$45.39
- 2. Petty cash =---- 54.00
- 3. Stamp box ----- Some coins

In addition, the following funds belonging to the staff were taken:

- 1. Coca-Cola sales approx. \$40.00
- 2. Coffee fund ---- approx. 40.00
- 3. Flower fund ---- approx. 50.00

The fireproof cabinet cost \$280.00 and had much damage done to it. This theft has been reported to the local police, insurance agent, the State Department of Education and the State Auditor's Office.

Booklet entitled "The $V\infty$ ational Education Needs of Montgomery County" was presented to each member. This was the report from a project of study carried on with federal funds.

Mr. Hale presented a proposed salary scale for 1971-72 of \$6800. to \$9350. with 15 steps for Collegiate and Collegiate Professional Certificate holders. Normal Professional and Elementary Certificate holders would be on a 12 year scale with \$5000. to \$6200. Special License holders would receive a \$4200, regardless of years of experience. \$800. additional was recommended for a teacher holding the Master's Degree.

Dr. Stewart recommended that \$1000.00 be given for holders of Master's Degrees. Representatives of the Montgomery County Education Association who were present urged that some salary increment be given to persons who had secured at least 15 hours of credit toward the Master's Degree. Mr. Hale described the difficulties involved in administering this type of increment. Mr. Sutphin expressed the feeling that some incentive, such as a leave of absence with pay, be given teachers as encouragement toward securing their Master's Degrees.

The Budget recommendations will be studied by the members and discussed further at the March 2 meeting.

The following bills were approved for payment on motion by Mr. Dunkenberger, seconded by Mr. Sutphin and passed:

This meeting was called for the purpose of opening bids on the construct Blacksburg High School. The following bids were opened and read aloud; Stewart were absent. Also present were Supt. R. T. Hale, E. L. King, B. Stevens and J. E. Earp. The Montgomery County School Board met in special session on the above date at 2:00 p.m. with the following members present: H. C. Graybeal, Chairman; Albin Bale, R. L. Sutphin and T. M. Dunkenberger. H. E. Poff and J. R. on the construction of illi

Charlotte Sowers

The Montgomery County School Board met in regular session on the above date at 7:30 p.m. with all members present. Also present were Supt. R. T. Hale, E. L. King, B. E. Stevens, G. C. Guilliams, J. E. Earp, R. C. Quesenberry.

The meeting was opened with prayer by Rev. Poff.

Minutes for the regular meeting of February 16 and special meeting of February 25 were approved without reading, since each member had been furnished with copies.

Letter was read from Henry B. Brockwell, Supervisor, NDEA, Title III, State Department of Education, congratulating the superintendent and staff for the good records kept as revealed by the recent audit of accounts for the period 1966 through 1970.

Letter was read from William C. Pursley, Assistant State Supervisor, Adult Education, State Department of Education, in which he commended the Superintendent and supervisory staff for the fine Adult Basic Education program being conducted. He stated, "The Montgomery County Adult Basic Education program is one of the best in the state and is certainly the best in Southwest Virginia."

An open letter to the Superintendent and School Board from the Steering Committee for the Montgomery County Citizens for Quality Education was Discussed. (Each member had received a copy of the letter.) The Superintendent was directed to write the group and express appreciation for their interest in increasing the quality of education for the youth of the county.

Request of Price's Fork School for 126 upper grade children to take a trip to Abingdon to attend Barter Theatre on April 14, using school buses, was approved on motion by Mr. Poff, seconded by Mr. Sale and passed.

Request of Christiansburg High School for seven students to travel to Williamsburg to participate in a scholarship contest in the fields of Biology, Chemistry, Mathematics and Physics at the College of William and Mary for an absence of two days was approved on motion by Mr. Dunkenberger, seconded by Mr. Sutphin and passed.

Mr. Robert L. Mills, Architect, has recommended that the Board accept the low base bid of J. H. Fralin and Son of Roanoke, Virginia, for construction of the Blacksburg High School at \$3,993,600.00, with the alternates to be considered further. He also recommended acceptance of the bid of Roanoke Engineering Sales for movable partitions in this building.

Mr. Sutphin moved that the architect's recommendation be accepted and that contract be awarded to the low bidder, seconded by Dr. Stewart and passed unanimously.

Mr. Dunkenberger moved that the low bid of Roanoke Engineering Sales for Movable partitions at \$21,286.00 also be accepted, seconded by Dr. Stewart and passed unanimously.

Mr. KennethebgeMothey, Anchitect, presented plans for the new Shristiansburg High School, and stated that the serious accident suffered by Mr. Shane had caused the delay in completion of the plans. He hopes to send the plans to Richmond by March 15, advertise for bids the first of April, and open bids on May 4. Color designs for the Shawsville and Riner Elementary Schools were presented and approved.

Mr. Hale reported that absenteeism because of flu had ranged from 13.9% on February 24 to 12.9% on March 2. It was not felt that this was severe enough to close schools.

Mr. Stevens reported that the seven children who were hospitalized as a result of the school bus accident on February 16 had all been released, and four of them are back in school. It is anticipated that the others will be back in school in a short period of time.

Mr. Stevens made the following recommendations to the School Board to improve school bus safety:

- 1. Remove bus from R. 665, south of I. 81, because of the hidden intersection with R. 787, until such time as the sight distance at the intersection can be improved. The present signs, "Dangerous Intersection", do not provide sufficient protection for the bus. Bus stop to be moved north of intersection on R. 787, approximately 150 ft. to top of the hill, where it can be seen from both directions.
- 2. Request the Sheriff's Department and the State Police to provide periodic radar surveillance in all county school zones during school day. Also that police be on duty from approximately 7:45 a.m. to 8:30 a.m., and 2:45 to 3:05 p.m. at Belview, and from 2:55 to 3:15 p.m. at Shawsville.
- 3. Request permission from the Department of Highways to move the speed control flashing sign at the west property line at Belview approximately 400 feet back from property line (toward Radford Arsenal) in order to warn motorists before they get to the school entrance.
- 4. Same request as Item #3 for Price's Fork.

Mr. Sutphin moved that the recommendations be accepted and that the staff take the necessary action to implement them. Dr. Stewart seconded the motion and it was passed unanimously.

In addition to the above, Elliston-Lafayette School has requested that "School Bus Stop" and school zone blinker lights be placed near the school. Mr. Hiatt, a teacher from theschool, was recently injured in an accident at this site, and there are problems connected with the school bus. Mr. Dunkenberger moved that the Highway Department be requested to install these signs, seconded by Mr. Sutphin and passed unanimously.

Phase II of the Building Program was to have been discussed at this meeting, but due to the illness of Mr. Mills, Architect, the Superintendent requested that this be discussed at a special meeting on Tuesday, March 9, at 7:30 p.m., at which time the budget would be discussed further. This was approved.

Bids on school bus bodies and chassis were opened and tabulated. Low bid of Teel Chevrolet at \$3510.63, and Ward Body Company at \$3250.00 for the 54-passenger bus for a total of \$6760.63; and low bid of Christiansburg Motor Company at \$4503.92, and Ward Body Company at \$3550.00, for a total of \$8053.92, were accepted on motion by Dr. Stewart, seconded by Mr. Sutphin and passed. Two 54-passenger and four 66-passenger buses will be purchased. All options are to be included, and a seat belt for the left side of the right front seat is to be provided.

Dr. Stewart moved that a seat belt in this same position be provided on <u>all</u> school buses during the summer, seconded by Mr. Dunkenberger and passed. The child who sits in this seat is to be required by the bus driver to fasten the belt.

The teacher salary scale proposed by the Superintendent was discussed, along with finge benefits requested by the Montgomery Education Association including income protection insurance for all employees, 2 days personal emergency leave for each teacher, and teachers retiring or voluntarily leaving the system being paid at the rate of one-half day's pay for any sick leave days they hold.

Mr. Sutphin moved that the salary scale be accepted with the exception that increments be raised from \$170. to \$180. at each step, and that \$1000. for the Master's Degree be included instead of \$800. Dr. Stewart seconded the motion, which was defeated by a vote of 3 to 2.

Mr. Dunkenberger moved that the Superintendent be requested to work up his recommendations regarding the fringe benefits, including both the MEA and the Superintendent's recommendations, seconded by Mr. Sutphin, and passed with a vote of 4 to 1.

Mr. Sale moved that the following bills and disbursements be approved for payment, seconded by Dr. Stewart and passed unanimously:

He condluded that the School Board is not authorized to make this gift without valuable consideration from the Authority.

The Montgomery County School Board met in special session for budget study on the above date at 7:30 p.m. with the following members present:
H. C. Graybeal, Chairman; T. M. Dunkenberger, H. E. Poff, J. R. Stewart, R. L. Sutphin. Albin Sale was absent. Supt. Hale was present, with E. L. King, J. E. Earp, and B. E. Stevens.

Mr. Crawford, representing Citizens for Quality Education, spoke briefly on this organization's support of an adequate budget which reflects the need for quality education. The Chairman expressed the Board's appreciation of the support of this organization and other citizens.

Mr. Robert L. Mills, Architect, reported that contract from Roanoke Engineering Sales and from J. H. Fralin and Son on the new Blacksburg High School were ready for study by the School Board Attorney. He recommended that bids for spreading top soil and seeding at this site be taken as soon as possible, also that kitchen equipment and science laboratory equipment be selected soon so that electrical connections can be provided for. He recommended that curb, paving and storm drainage be advertised this summer.

Dr. Stewart moved that the Board advertise for bids at the earliest practicable date on the spreading of top soil and seeding, seconded by Mr. Sutphin and passed unanimously.

Mr. Sutphin moved that the Architect be instructed to advertise and receive bids on the kitchen and science equipment at the earliest possible date, seconded by Mr. Dunkenberger and passed unanimously.

Mr. Mills presented drawings of the site plan and preliminary floor plan for the new elementary school in Blacksburg at the Harding Avenue site. The school is planned for 525 pupils, and will house kindergarten through fifth grade. The Board set March 30 as a meeting date for study of preliminary drawings for both Blacksburg and Christiansburg elementary schools.

Payment of the following bills was approved unanimously onmotion by Mr. Poff, seconded by Mr. Sutphin:

1969 School Building Fund - Check Nos. 90,91 - \$63,900.00.

The Superintendent presented a tentative budget incorporating a salary scale which he recommended of \$6800. to \$9350. in 15 steps, with \$800. increment for the Master's Degree, plus two days personal leave for teachers. He pointed out items requiring increases in each category of the budget. Mr. Hale stated that he had received the income protection insurance premium quotations too late this date for his study so that he could make a recommendation. This amount would have to be considered in deciding on the final budget if the Board chooses to provide this additional benefit.

Mr. Poff expressed his approval of the budget as presented and his confidence in the Superintendent and Assistant Superintendent and their knowledge of the needs as represented in the budget presented.

Dr. Stewart and Mr. Sutphin spoke in favor of the proposal made at the last meeting of the Board for a larger increase in teachers' salaries.

Dr. Stewart moved the adoption of a salary scale of \$6800. to \$9500. in 15 steps, with \$1000. increment for Master's Degree. The Collegiate Certificate scale would be \$6600. for no experience, and \$6780. for step one on the scale. Motion was seconded by Mr. Sutphin, and defeated by a vote of 3 to 2.

Due to the absence of one Board member, it was voted to adjourn to the following night, March 10, at 8:30 p.m., so that further discussion could be held with all members present.

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The Montgomery County School Board met in an adjourned session at 8:30 p.m. on the above date. The meeting was called to order by Dr. J. R. Stewart, Vice Chairman and the Superintendent was asked to discuss various items in the 1971-72 budget, including fringe benefits which had not previously been included. The Superintendent made a statement regarding the fact that this was merely a working, tentative budget which could not be released to the public or the press until it has been approved by the School Board and presented to the Board of Supervisors.

On the arrival of the chairman, Dr. H. C. Graybeal, he assumed the chair. All members were present, in addition to Supt. Hale, E. L. King, B. E. Stevens, G. C. Guilliams and J. E. Earp.

The Superintendent presented the budget by individual sections and pointed out the major changes which included two days personal leave for teachers, the accident insurance coverage of all pupils at School Board expense, the furnishikng of income protection insurance for all employees under contract with an income between \$2000. and \$12,000. who work at least 25 hours per week. This would assure an income of 60% of the salary of a person who becomes disabled, after the first sixty days of disability.

Dr. Stewart pointed out that nothing was included under Capital Outlay for the construction of the new elementary schools and the additions to existing buildings. He moved that the estimated monetary needs for the next fiscal year for the new Blacksburg and Christiansburg Elementary Schools be included in the operating budget under Capital Outlay, plus the other buildings in Phase II of the building program, less the amount which would be obtained from the Literary Fund. Motion was seconded by Mr. Sutphin.

Mr. Hale pointed out that these items were already before the governing body of the county and they had made application for a Literary Loan of \$700,000. toward the funding of a new Christiansburg elementary school. The Board of Supervisors is also very much aware of our other building needs and already had been presented an approximate schedule necessary for funding when preliminary plans have been completed.

Dr. Stewart's motion was defeated by a vote of 3 to 2.

Mr. Dunkenberger moved that an addendum be submitted to the Board of Supervisors with the budget, calling to their attention the monies needed for both Phase I and Phase II of the building program during 1971-72 fiscal year. Dr. Stewart seconded the motion and it was passed by a vote of 4 for; and 1 abstention.

Dr. Stewart moved that the inclusion of \$21,149.00 for income protection insurance for all employees as described above be included in the budget, plus a salary scale of \$6800. to \$9500., plus an increment of \$1000., and a scale for Collegiate Certificate holders of \$6600. for no experience and \$6780. at the first step on the scale. Mr. Sutphin seconded the motion.

At this point the Chairman called for a point of order, since this was essentially the same motion that had been made and defeated at the special meeting on March 9. He appointed Mr. King as parliamentarian.

A study of Roberts' Rules of Order revealed that only a person who voted in majority on the previous motion could move to reconsider this motion.

Dr. Graybeal declared the motion out of order, and Dr. Stewart then requested a reconsideration of the motion.

Mr. Poff moved that the motion be reconsidered, seconded by Mr. Sutphin and defeated by a vote of 3 to 2.

Mr. Sutphin moved that the Superintendent's proposed salary scale be adopted with the exception of adopting the MEA proposal of a beginning salary of \$6750. with \$180. increment at each step on the scale, with a top salary of \$9450. and a Master's Degree increment of \$1000. Dr. Stewart seconded the motion and it was defeated by a vote of 3 to 2.

Mr. Poff moved that the recommendations and proposals of the superintendent and his staff as reflected in the total budget be adopted as presented. This motion died for lack of a second.

The Board members requested time for further discussion of items in the budget.

Dr. Stewart began a review of recommendations included in the evaluation: report on Blacksburg High School. One item was concerned with provision of materials and textbooks for slow learners. He was assured by members of the staff and the Superintendent that many of these items were being provided under the Advance program and in other ways.

A discussion was held regarding the elimination of all student fees. The Director of Instruction and Superintendent recommended that the Health and Physical Education fees (which cover mostly articles of clothing retained by the student), and shop and art fees (which include items which are kept by the student), be retained. Dr. Stewart moved that a policy be adopted which would abolish all student fees with the exception of the above-mentioned at the beginning of the 1971-72 session. After he was informed that the principals and central office staff had been working on the problem and working toward this goal, he withdrew his motion and moved that the School Board adopt a policy of working toward the abolishment of fees for classes and courses in schools and try to set a deadline to achieve this. Motion was seconded by Mr. Sutphin and passed by a vote of 3 to 1.

Mr. Sutphin moved that the meeting be adjourned for further discussion of the budget at the regular meeting on March 16. Dr. Stewart seconded the motion and it was defeated by a vote of 3 to 2.

Motion was made by Mr. Poff, seconded by Mr. Sale and passed that the discussion be continued in the hope of passage of the budget. Motion carried.

Mr. Sutphin asked questions about proposed salary increases for bus drivers, janitors and mechanics, and was given this information. He asked if site improvement at Blacksburg High School was included and was informed that it was, in addition to the same for Shawsville High School.

Mr. Pôff moved that the revised budget as presented by the Superintendent in the amount of \$5,109,917.54 be approved, seconded by Mr. Dunkenberger and defeated by a vote of 3 to 2.

Motion made, seconded and carried for adjournement.

The students will work with principals and teachers in setting up programs and distributing educational materials. A letter was read from the Blacksburg Presbyterian Church endorsing the program. k Mr. Dunkenberger moved that if the materials and publicity are agreeable with the superintendent and principals that the campaign as described be conducted in the schools, seconded by Dr. Stewart and passed unanimously.

Request of Mr. A. Curtis Gray, Principal, Blacksburg High School, for volleyball and basketball games between the Christiansburg and Blacksburg High School bares (closed affairs with faculty supervision and no admission charge) to be held one at each school, was approved on motion by Mr. Sutphin, seconded by Mr. Poff and passed.

The Christiansburg Jaycees requested the use of the Christiansburg High School gymnasium on March 26, April 3 and August 20 for fund raising projects to pay for the scoreboard this group donated to the Christiansburg Recreation Department. This was approved with details to be approved by the principal, on motion by Dr. Stewart, seconded by Mr. Dunkenberger and passed.

Request of the Senior Class of Christiansburg High School to make their annual educational trip to New York from April 19-24 was approved on motion by Mr. Sale, seconded by Mr. Poff and passed.

Request of the Senior Class of Shawsville High School to take an educational trip to Washington and New York the latter part of April was approved on motion by Mr. Sale, seconded by Mr. Dunkenberger and passed.

Request of Victory Temple Pentecostal Church for the use of Christiansburg Primary School auditorium for a hymn sing on April 3, was approved on motion by Br. Stewart, seconded by Mr. Sutphin and passed.

Mr. Hale reported that the Public Service Authority has requested an easement across a small portion of the Bethel Elementary School grounds for installation of water lines. He recommended approval of this request, as the well at the school has been giving considerable difficulty in the past few weeks. The approval would be subject to the advice of a surveyor, and the plan would be worked out in such a way that it will not interfere with present or future installations at the Ischool. Mr. Dunkenberger moved that the easement be approved, seconded by Mr. Sale and passed unanimously.

- 1. <u>Single</u> period examinations to cover the semester's work shall be given in each course for all students in Montgomery County in Grades 8-12 the second semester of 1971.
- 2. No more than two examinations shall be given any one day..
- 3. Seniors shall have the option of taking an examination or not at the end of the second semester.
 - (a) Each senior shall make a declaration of his intent to take or not to take the examination in a given course by a definite and preestablished date, after which he may not change his mind.
 - (b) If he does not take the examination, his semester grade will be the average of the preceding three six-weeks' grades.
 - (c) Seniors who elect not to take an examination must bring a signed statement from their parents to the teacher of each subject to indicate parental approval of the senior's choice.
 - (d) Seniors may obtain their averages to date in a course before making their decision whether to take the examination or not.
 - (e) Any senior who does not take the examination in a given course is required to be in the classroom during the examination period doing work assigned by the teacher of the course.
 - (f) English and government examinations shall not be given the same day. These two examinations may be scheduled earlier than the regular examination period since these two subjects are required of all seniors for graduation.

Dr. Stewart moved that the trial policy be implemented for this year only, with a report and recommendations from the principals before a permanent policy is established, seconded by Mr. Poff and passed. .

It is proposed that this building will house kindergarten, grades 1 and 2, and that the present-Primary School building will house grades 3, 4 and 5. The Board members will take the plans under consideration and inform the architect if they approve their being taken to the State Department of Education in the present form.

Request from Mr. A. Curtis Gray, Principal, Blacksburg High School, to give publicity and sell tickets for the after-hours activity at the Armory following the annual dance was presented. This Will not be a school=sponsored activity, but is highly recommended by the school authorities as a means of keeping the students occupied in wholesome recreation. Dr. Stewart moved that the request be approved, seconded by Mr. Dunkenberger and passed.

Request from the Committee on Relevance of the Blacksburg High School P.T.A. to hold seminars on Psychology and Anthropology on dates to be approved by the principal, was approved on motion by Dr. Stewart, seconded by Mr. Sutphin and passed. Dr. Stewart commended the P.T.A. for their efforts in this regard and the Board concurred.

Mr. King presented a list of school properties with their insurable values as determined last year to each School Board member. The Montgomery County School Board met in special session on the above date at 7:30 plm. with all members present. Supt. Hale, Mr. King and Mr. Stevens were present.

Mr. Mills showed slides of building materials to the Board members, the County Executive Secretary and members of the Board of Supervisors.

The School Board authorized the Superintendent to negotiate with the agencies carrying insurance on the placement of insurance on the buildings and their contents.

The Montgomery County School Board met in regular session on the above date at 8:00 p.m. with all members present. Supt. Hale, Messrs. King and Stevens were present.

The meeting was opened with prayer by Rev. H. E. Poff.

Mr. Dunkenberger moved that minutes for the regular meeting of April 20 and special meetings of April 26 and 29 be approved without reading since each member had received copies. Mr. Sale seconded the motion and it was passed unanimously.

Mr. Anderson and Mr. East of the Shawnee Booster Club, Shawsville High School, stated that the Club had raised \$1000.00 toward the purchase of bleachers for the athletic field at this school and requested the School Board to aid in the project by allotting \$1500.00 toward its completion. Mr. Hale stated that the School Board Policies are in the process of being updated and re-worded by a School Law and Policy specialist and when completed will be fully publicized. In the meantime, Virginia School Laws are being followed in the suspension and expulsion of students. The main complaint seemed to be that letters from principals notifying parents of suspensions pending study by the School Board did not clearly state that the parent or student could appear before the School Board at a stated time. Mr. Sutphin moved that letters from principals to parents in such cases be sent by registered mail and that they contain clear statements regarding time when parents may appear before the School Board. Motion was seconded by Mr. Dunkenberger and passed. opening to the transfer of t

Mr. Poff expressed uneasiness at the large number of trips involving such large numbers of children due to increased dangers on the highways. Mr. Robert Mills, Architect, reported that he and Mr. Hale would take the elementary schoolpreliminary plans to Richmond on May 10 for review of the kindergarten additions by State Department of Education personnel. He recommended the use of embossed vinyl under the trade name "Robbins Sport-Tred" for the gym floors at Blacksburg and Christiansburg High Schools. He, Mr. Hale and Mr. Dunkenberger had inspected some of these in use in schools and a boys'club, and were impressed with its appearance, utility and ease of maintenance. Mr. Sutphin moved that this type of flooring be used in the Blacksburg High School main gymnasium at a cost not to exceed \$3500. Motion was seconded by Dr. Stewart and passed . unanimously.

Dr. Stewart moved that the main bid for the gymnasium floor at Christians-burg High School indicate the use of this same vinyl type Sport=Tred material, with the first alternate to be wood. Mr. Sutphin seconded the motion and it was passed unanimously.

The Superintendent reported that he had been notified in a letter dated April 23 that all Montgomery County Schools had been accredited for the current year. This is the first year of accreditation for elementary schools, and Mr. Hale stated that the staff would be working to maintain this accreditation.

Mr. Dunkenberger moved that bids on coal, oil, gasoline and typewriters be requested for opening at the first regular meeting of the School Board in June, seconded by Mr. Poff and passed.

Mr. Hale reported that funds for driver education would be reduced by the State Board of Education this year and would be prorated for the individual school divisions. He presented Mr. Samuel J. Lucas, Assistant Principal of Auburn High and Elementary School, who supervised the Driver Education program in the county last summer and will do so again this year. Mr. Lucas described the driver training program which includes both classroom and behind-the-wheel instruction. The classroom instruction is usually taught to 10th grade students. There are some 8th and 9th graders who qualify in age for driver's permits but who have not received the required classroom instruction due to their not having reached the 10th grade. Mr. Lucas proposed that classroom instruction be provided these students at ~ the beginning of the summer and that a \$10.00 fee be charged to cover total cost of this classroom program. (Classroom instruction is a prerequisite to the behind-the-wheel phase of the instruction.) The regular driving instruction for approximately 570 tenth graders would be carried on as usual. Mr. Hale recommended the program as presented. Mr. Sutphin moved that the driver training program be approved as presented with details to be worked out by the Superintendent and his staff. seconded by Mr. Sale and passed unanimously.

Porposal of Simmons and Winbery, Certified Public Accountants, to audit the accounts of the 14 schools with cafeterias at the same cost as last year - \$2100.00 - was accepted on motion by Mr. Dunkenberger, seconded by Mr. Sale and passed.

The Montgomery County School Board met in regular session on the above date at 8:00 p.m. with all members present. Supt. Hale, Messrs. King, Stevens and Guilliams were also present.

Minutes for the regular meeting of May 4 were approved without reading since each member had received a copy.

A group of students from Blacksburg High School was present to request that the demerit system be abolished, more time be given between classes, a court of appeals composed of three students, three teachers and an administrator be formed to study proposed suspensions and expulsions and that a shelter for food vending machines be constructed outside the main building. Mr. Hale presented the architect's report on progress with plans for the two new elementary school and kindergarten additions. Dr. Stewart moved that the superintendent be requested to discuss the problem of funds with the architects and negotiate with them on a "ggod-faith" basis so that they can proceed without interruption on development of working drawings for these projects. Mr. Sutphin seconded the motion and it was passed unanimously.

Mr. Moeschler, Sanitation Officer; Dr. Long, Health: Officer, and Mr. Hughes of the Architect's office, were present to discuss the matter of a sewerege problem at the new Riner Elementary School. 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Mr. Hale announced that ameeting of the representatives of each of the three school boards which formerly operated the Øo-Tech School in Radford were being asked to meet at the School Board office in Radford on Thursday,

May 20, to discuss the disposition of equipment left at this school. Dr. Graybeal and Mr. Sale felt they could attend, and if not, Dr. Stewart thought that he could go.

It was reported that the Board of Supervisors had made a tie vote on the School Board bddget and that it had been sent to the tie=breaker.

Mr. King reported that two-thirds of the building and contents insurance for the schools expires June 1, and the other one-third is being cancelled. Mr. Pierce, Broker of Record, has been attempting to get the insurance placed through the local agents, but has not received replies to his inquiries. On motion by Dr. Stewart, seconded by Mr. Sale and passed unanimously, Mr. King and Mr. Hale were given authority to set deadlines for securing this insurance, and change the percentages for the various agencies in any way necessary to secure complete coverage.

The Montgomery County School Board met on the above date at 9:00 p.m. with the following members present: H. C. Graybeal, Chairman; H. E. Poff, R. L. Sutphin and T. M. Dunkenberger. Albin Sale and J. R. 'tewart were absent. Also present were Supt. Hale, B. E. Stevens, E. L. King, J. E. Earp.

The Chairman read a letter from the architect of Christiansburg High School concerning a contract for grading and possibly a contract for building construction.

Moved by Mr. Sutphin that the Board negotiate a contract with Bowling for grading and dowing the necessary engineering to establish grades, lines, etc., at a price not to exceed \$225,000. Motion withdrawn.

Moved by Mr. Dunkenberger that the architects be instructed to prepare drawings and re-bid the grading of the Christiansburg site as soon as possible. Seconded by Mr. Sutphin and passed unanimously.

Moved by Mr. Sutphin that the School Board accept the architects' recommendation to delete the red shaded area and vocational facilities and also delete the yellow shaded area from the contract, and that the School Board request the architects to modify the drawings and specifications when necessary and readvertise for bids for the building proper as suggested and request bids at the earliest practical date, and that the School Board reject the proposal to negotiate with the apparent low bidder, J. E. Davis and Sons, seconded by Mr. Dunkknberger. Motion passed unanimously.

Mr. Dunkenberger moved that since football is not available at Auburn, the boy be permitted to attend Christiansburg High School for the session 1971-72, with the parents to be responsible for his transportation both to and from school. Motion was seconded by Dr. Stewart and passed unanimously.

A School Calendar was explained by Mr. Earp, with teachers workshop to begin on August 23, and pupils reporting on August 30. The Easter vacation will remain firm, and snow'days will be made up at the end of the session unless they are so excessive that other arrangements will have to be made. If it is possible for teachers to reach their respective schools on snow days, two teacher work days will be accomplished in this way. Mr. Dunkenberger moved that the calendar be approved as presented, seconded by Mr. Sale and passed unanimously.

Mr. Hale reported that application has been made to FHA and the State Water Control Board for financial assistance to the Public Service Authority on installation of a sewer system at the Riner Elementary School.

Preliminary plans on the school additions were taken to Richmond by Supt. Hale and Mr. Hill of Smithey and Boynton. These include the renovations and additions to Auburn and Shawsville High Schools; Price's Fork, Belview and Bethel kindergarten additions. It is believed that approval of these plans will be forthcoming soon.

Dr. Stewart moved that the Superintendent be directed to work with the architects to provide revised estimates on grading, working drawings and otherscosts of the two new elementary schools, so that the School Board can arrange a meeting with the Board of Supervisors to discuss financing of these projects. The Montgomery County School Board met in regular session on the above date at 8:00 p.m. with all members present. Also present were Supt. Hale, E. L. King, J. E. Earp, B. E. Stevens and G. C. Guilliams.

Supt. Hale took the chair for McMiNations for Chairman. Dr. Jeffrey R. Stewart was elected and assumed the chairmanship. the eighth grade for the 1971-72 session so that he cna play football.
Their residence is in the Auburn High School attendance area and football
is not offered at that school. Mr. Sutphin moved that the request be granted, with the

Graybeal, H.E. Poff and R.L.Sut phin. Albin Sale was present. Supt. Hale, J.E. Earp, G.C. Guilliams and B.E. Stevens were present.

The meeting was opened with prayer by Rev. Poff.

Minutes for the regular meeting of July 20 were approved without reading, since each member had received a copy.

Mr. W.R.L. Cratt, Jr., was spokesman for a large delegation of patrons of Christiansburg High School, who were present to request that the School Board approve purchase of new bleachers for the school athletic field. The original request indicated a cost of \$18,000 or more. Mr. Ralph Erwin, Assistant Principal of Christiansburg High School, gave information regarding 10 units of bleachers which could be purchased at \$1,950. plus freight from the Snyder Bleacher Division. This would provide seating for an additional 500 persons. Mr. Sutphin moved that the School Board allot \$1,000.00 toward this project, if funds were available. Athletic Booster Club has agreed to pay the balance. Motion was seconded by Dr. Graybeal and passed, with one "No" vote and one abstention.

A RESOLUTION PROVIDING FOR THE GRANTING OF AN EASEMENT THROUGH CERTAIN SCHOOL PROPERTY

I to the term of the

BE IT RESOLVED by County School Board of Montgomery County, Virginia:

That, Whereas, by resolution adopted by the School Board on the 9th day of January, 1968; it agreed to provide an easement for a Town of Christiansburg. As sewer pipee line through a portion of the School Board's property in the Town of Christiansburg, which it acquired from William R.L. Craft, Jr., to serve the property of Pioneer Apartments, a partnership, which adjoins the School Board's property on the west.

Now, Therefore, BE IT RESOLOVED

That County School Board of Montgomery Countygrant and convey unto Town of Christiansburg a perpetual right of way and easement, 15 feet wide, to lay,
construct, install, keep, maintain and replace a sewer
pipe line, with the necessary manholes and equipment,
under, through and across a portion of the land of
the School Board which it acquired from William R.L.
Craft, Jr., lying in the Town of Christiansburg, in the

Riner Magisterial District of Montgomery County, Virginia, which right-of-way and easement is more particularly described and located as follows:

A right-of-way and easement, 15 feet in width to be 7½ feet on each side of the center line thereof, which center line is to be located as follows:

BEGINNING at Sta. 0 - 00.00 at a " manhole in an existing sewer line located on the property of the zSchool Board, which manhole is approximately 300 feet west of North Franklin Street; thence S 76 W to Sta. 5 - 78.00 at a manhole; thence S 68 34 W to Sta. 7 - 40.00 at a point in the line of the land of Pioneer Apartments, which point is a short 'distance north of the southeastern corner of the land of Pioneer Apartments, according to a plat, dated April 16, 1971, made by W.F. Alderman. The land of Pioneer Apts. is described as "Pioneer Hills Inc." on said plat.

That the Town be given the right to make such slight variations in the location of the easement as may be indicated in the construction of the line.

That the easement be granted with the understanding and stipulation that should be School Board place any fill in the area where the easement is located, the necessary elevating of any manholes in the sewer pipe line shall be at the sole expense of the Town of Christiansburg.

That the granting of said easement is conditioned upon first obtaining the approval of the Judge of the Circuit Court of Montgomery County. The attorney for the School Board is authorized and directed to petititon the Circuit Court of Montgomery County; for approval and authority to grant said easement.

An elementary school building or buildings (kindergarten, and first through fifth grades), at a site in the vicinity of the Village of Shawsville, to consist of general classrooms, library, cafeteria, kitchen, and other spaces to provide for an adequate elementary school program to serve the general area now being served by Alleghany District High and Elementary School.

An elementary school building or buildings (kindergarten, and first through fifth grades), at a site in the vicinity of the Village of Riner, to consist of general classrooms, library, cafeteria, kitchen, and other spaces to provide for an adequate elementary school program to serve the general area now being served by Auburn High and Elementary School.

And, to the extent that surplus funds are available after adequate provision has been made for the constructing and equipping of the aforesaid new school buildings, the constructing and equipping of additions to, some of the existing school facilities within Montgomery County.

Mr.Earp presented a schedule of high school fees prepared after study by the high school principals. They recommend that fees be standardized throughout the county schools for the coming session, in the hope of eliminating some of them in the future as discussed in a previous meeting of the School Board. Mr. Sutphin moved that the recommendation be accepted as presented, seconded by Mr.Dunkenberger and passed. The Federal Government (USDA) has required the State of Virginia to update the income scale used in determining eligibility for free or reduced price lunches for pupils. A copy of adjusted scale was presented to each Board member and unanimously approved on motion by Mr.Dunkenberger, seconded by Dr. Graybeal.

Mr. Hale reported that the final layouts for equipment in the Riner and Shawsville Elementary Schools have been completed and given to the same suppliers who bid on the Blacksburg High School equipment. These bids will be received at the regular meeting of the School Board on September 7.

Mr. Hale called attention of the members to the Revised Policy Statement issued by the Virginia School Boards Association. These involved insurance on buildings and buses, and school bus speed limits, and some changes in the By-laws. He urged members to attend the state conference of the Association in Richmond October 7-9.

A list of teachers nominated by the superintendent for the session 1971-72 was presented to each Board member. Mr. Sutphin moved that the entire list of instructional personnel as presented be approved, seconded by Mr.

Sale and passed unanimously.

The following bills were approved for payment on motion by Mr. Sutphin, seconded by Mr. Poff and passed: Operating Fund-\$1834.00, check nos. 8886 through 8910.

Mr. Sale moved that the Board go into executive session for the discussion of a student problem, seconded by Dr. Graybeal and passed.

Judge G. Garland Wilson of the Juvenile and Domestic Relations Court has approved the release of Steven Wayne Dowdy from compulsory attendance, after recommendations from his parents, the school principal, and the Visiting Teacher. This was approved on motion by Mr. Sutphin, seconded by Mr. Dunkenberger and passed.

Several requests for changes in high school attended were discussed by the Superintendent. He was directed to study the individual situations with his staff and make recommendations to the School Board if a decision cannot be reached regarding the qualifications and eligibility of students to make these changes.

Mr. Gene Edwards appeared before the Board to request that his two children be permitted to enroll in Auburn School although he is temporarily residing in Christiansburg until a law suit can be settled regarding his dwelling in the Riner attendance area. He was quite willing to enroll them in Christiansburg if it becomes known that he will be making his permanent residence in Christiansburg. Mr.Sutphin moved that the request be granted, for the 1971-72 session, seconded by Dr. Graybeal and passed.

The case of John Alan Keim, whose father had requested that he be permitted to attend Christiansburg High School although the residence had been moved to Radford, was discussed. Mr. Keim had written a letter stating that he would be willing to pay tuition if the boy could continue at Christiansburg High School. Mr. Dunkenberger moved that John be permitted to attend Christiansburg High School provided that his parents pay the difference between any funds received from the State and actual expenses of his education in this county for the 1971-72 school session.

Mrs. Irene Kirchman, Visiting Teacher, was present to discuss the case of Corey Godfrey, who was expelled from Gilbert Linkous School last year. Mrs. Kirchman recommended that the boy be permitted to attend Margaret Beeks for the 1971-72 school session to see if some of his difficulties can be eliminated by a different environment. Mr. Dunkenberger moved that this permission be granted, seconded by Mr. Sutphin and passed.

The Montgomery County School Board met in regular session on the above date at 8:00 p.m. with the following members present: J. R. Stewart, Chairman; H. C. Graybeal, H. E. Poff, Albin Sale, Roy L. Sutphin. T. M. Dunkenberger was absent. Also present were Supt. Hale, Messrs. King, Stevens, Earp and Guilliams.

The meeting was opened with prayer by Rev. Poff.

Minutes for the regular meeting of August 17 were approved without reading, since each member had received a copy. .

Mr. Leslie L. Saylors, with his daughter, Jacqueline, appeared before the Board to request that the girl be allowed to attend Christiansburg High School, although the family resides in the Auburn attendance area and she has already enrolled in the eighth grade at Auburn High School. The reason given for transfer was so she could enroll for Art and Band Classes. Art is not offered at Auburn until the 11th or 12th grade, and Band at the 9th grade level. Since art and band are not offered at Christiansburg High School until the 9th grade level, it was agreed by the Board members that present policy does not permit a transfer in such cases.

Virgnia Polytechnic Institute and State University made an offer of \$555.00 each for school buses nos. 46 and 27, which will be retired from use by the School Board. Mr. Hale recommended sale of the buses since this is permitted in case of purchase by another state agency without sealed bids or auction. He and Mr. Stevens expressed the opinion that the price was fair, in light of past sale of such equipment. Mr. Sutphin moved that the buses be sold at the price indicated, as soon as they can be released from service in the county, seconded by Mr. Poff and passed.

Request of Blacksburg High School for permission for four Forestry students to attend the East Coast Sawmill and Logging Equipment Exposition in Richmond on September 17, 1971, was approved on motion by Dr. Graybeal, seconded by Mr. Sale and passed.

Request of Blacksburg High School for the use of 3 school buses to transport their band to Bristol to attend a Band Festival on Saturday, October 2, was approved on motion by Dr. Graybeal, seconded by Mr. Sutphin and passed.

Mr. Robert Frye of Kinsey, Motley, Shane and Mills, Architects, was present to ppen the bids for kitchen equipment for the Shawsville and Riner Elemetary Schools. Bids were received from Acme Equipment Company, Eastern Sales & Equipment Co., Grant E. Key, Kolbe Company, and Wm. P. Swartz and Co., Inc. Mr. Sutphin moved that low bid of Wm. P. Swartz and Co., Inc. in the amount of \$53,838.00 for both schools, be accepted if details are approved after thorough review by Mr. Hale and the Architects. Mr. Sale seconded the motion and it was passed unanimously.

Mr. Hale reported that the schools had opened in a very smooth manner with no unusual problems encountered. He presented enrollment figures for the third day of school. There was been a reduction in the number of students enrolling for courses at the Vocational School in Radford, and this has caused some concern, but it is felt that the distance which has to be travelled - from Shawsville, especially - may be a contributing factor. Lunch is being transported from the Elliston-Lafayette School to the Ironto School this year, rather than transporting the pupils from Ironto to Elliston-Lafayette and this is working out very well.

Dr. Stewart was unanimously elected official delegate of the Board to the Virginia School Boards Association meeting in Richmond October 7-9. All members who could possibly go were urged to attend so that the Board would be well represented.

Mr. Hale reported that the Price Freeze which was ordered by the President on August 14 would affect the furnishing of disability insurance as a fringe benefit for the teachers. He stated that he had not found a company which met the requirements for the coverage wanted and was still trying to work this out. A definite ruling has not yet been received on how teachers' salaries are affected by the freeze and this is delaying preparation of the September payroll.

Mr. Sutphin moved, seconded by Mr. Poff and passed, that bids be received at the October 5 meeting of the Board for bld school buses, other automotive equipment and miscellaneous items.

Dunkenberger, Albin Sale and Roy L. Sutphin. H.E. Poff was absent. Supt. Hale, Messrs. Guilliams, King, Earp, and Stevens were present.

Minutes for the regular meeting of November 2 and November 9 were approved without reading, since each member had been furnished with copies.

Mrs. Charlotte Beamer, Principal, Margaret Beeks School, was present to request the use of a new progress report for the primary pupils in her school. The report was devised with the assistance of a parent-teacher committee, and was reviewed carefully by the Board members. Mr. Dunkenberger moved that the report be used on a trial basis for the remainder of this school year, seconded by Mr. Sale and passed.

Members of the Blacksburg Athletic Foundation, with Mr. Bud Devens as spokesman, appeared before the Board to request that the plan for re-locating the football field at Blacksburg High School be approved at once, so that the work could be started. They have secured volunteers to proceed with the work, and there will be no cost to the School Board at this time. Mr. Sutphin moved that the Athletic Foundation request be granted to turn the field 90 degrees, as shown on the plan, including grading, relocation of lights, etc. Motion was seconded by Mr. Dunkenberger and passed. Mr. Hale stated that he preferred that the School Board equipment and personnel be used for the grading, because of unsatisfactory experiences in the past with volunteer efforts.

Mr. East of the Ironto community was present to request the use of the extra room at Ironto School which is not used for school purposes, for two meetings per month of a newly formed Boy Scout Troop. The parents will accept responsibility for keeping the building clean, and . . . cooperate fully with the teachers. Mr. Dunkenberger moved that the use of the building he allowed on a trial basis, seconded by Dr. Graybeal and passed.

On Motion by Dr. Graybeal, seconded by Mr. Sale and passed, approval was granted for three students from Christiansburg High School and four students from Blacksburg High School to attend the Virginia Junior. Science Engineering and Humanities Symposium at the University of Virginia December 5 through 7.

Request of the Pentecostal Holiness Church to sponsor a gospel sing in the Christiansburg High School auditorium on December 9 was approved on motion by Mr. Dunkenberger, seconded by Dr. Graybeal and passed.

Mr. Hale reported that grading is progressing more satisfactorily at the new Christiansburg High School site.

He also stated that he had been to Richmond to discuss funds for the new vocational departments, and was informed that it is hoped approval can be forthcoming in March. Reimbursement will be 67% on the equipment at new Blacksburg and Christiansburg High Schools. Construction eligible for vocational building funds is reimbursed at present at the rate of 42%. In the next few weeks area supervisors will be working with local personnel to draw up equipment lists for the various vocational departments.

Mr. Sutphin asked about the landscaping and playground equipment for the new Shawsville and Riner elementary schools. Mr. Hale requested that this be considered after the pupils have been moved into the schools, so that the principals and faculties can have a little time to consider just what is needed.

The State Department of Education has requested that division superintendents each appoint a committee in their respective divisions on Standards of Quality, which would include the superintendent, a supervisor of instruction, an elementary school principal, a high school principal, one or more classroom teachers, a school board member, a PTA representative, and the like. Dr. Jeffrey R. Stewart was elected to serve as the representative of Montgomery County School Board on this committee.

Mr. Jack Clarke and Mr. Bill Aldridge spoke on behalf of the Auburn-Parent-Teachers Association, requesting that the new elementary school in Riner be named for Mr. Manuel Reynolds, Principal of the Auburn High School, in reco gnition of his long and faithful service to education in the county. The Board advised that the matter would be taken under consideration.

Dr. Graybeal moved that advertisement for bids on eight new school buses be made and that bids be received at the February 8 meeting of the Board, seconded by Mr. Stuphin and passed unanimously.

Superintendent Hale requested permission to use January 20, a scheduled work day for teachers, as a regular school day to make up the one day already lost because of snow. The teachers' work day will be re-scheduled for a day on which pupils will be unable to attend school, or on a Saturday. This was approved on motion by Mr. Dunkenberger, seconded by Mr. Sale and passed.

Supt. Hale presented a review and progress to date of both. Phases I and II of the building program. He was instructed to appear before the Board of Supervisors at the earliest possible date to renew the request for appropriation of funds for the continuance and completion of Phase II.

The following bills and disbursements were unanimously approved for payment:

On motion by Mr. Sutphin, seconded by Mr. Christopher, the following resolution was passed by the Montgomery County School Board:

WHEREAS, the Montgomery County School Board has been the recipient of \$2,041.33 as a bequest made by Faye H. Norris in her will of October 3, 1967, and

WHEREAS, said will reads in part as follows: "to County School Board of Montgomery County, to be used for the Blacksburg High School Library;" therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED that the funds be transmitted to Blacksburg High School, Mr. A. Curtis Gray, Principal, to be deposited in the bank on interest until the total proceeds, principal and interest are needed to purchase books for the new Blacksburg High School library, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED That the Principal and head librarian of the New Blacksburg High School give a full written report to the School Board on the expenditure of the funds.

The meeting was adjourned and the new members were conducted on a tour of the School Board Office building.

SPECIAL MEETING

January 11, 1972

The Montgomery County School Board met in special session the above date at 7:30 p.m. The following members were present: J.R. Stewart, Chairman; T.M. Dunkenberger, H.C. Graybeal, R.E. Christopher, R.L. Sutphin, R.E. Mathena, Albin Sale, Glenn D. Walters. Supt. Hale, E.L. King, B.E. Stevens and J.E. Earp were present. H.E. Poff was absent due to illness.

The following bids were received at 2 p.m. this date for the erection of new Christiansburg High School:

B.J. Construction Co. - \$3,597.262. J.E. Davis and Son - 3,100,000. J.H. Fralin and Son - 3,442,000. Graves Construction Co. - 3,633,000.

Mr. F.A. Shane of the architects' office was present to discuss the above bids and the alternates. He recommended acceptance of the base bid, but requested that approval be withheld on alternates 2 and 3, paving and related curb work for the access road and construction sites, respectively, until he could discuss them with the low bidder. Dr. Graybeal moved that the low bid of J.E. Davis and Son be accepted on recommendation of the architect, and that alternate items two and three be acted upon at the next meeting of the Board, seconded by Mr. Sutphin and passed unanimously.

Mr. Hale reported that Dr. Mary Tom Long, County Health Officer, had requested permission to distribute a booklet entitled "Drugs and You" to all of the seventh grade pupils in the county. The Board members reviewed the booklet, and Mr. Mathena moved that permission be granted for its distribution, seconded by Mr. Christopher, and passed.

The high school activity reports have been reviewed by the Director of Instruction and Superintendent and they recommended that the reports be approved for submission to the State Department of Education. Mr. Dunkenberger moved that the reports be approved, seconded by Mr. Sale and passed unanimously.

Mr. Hale reported that he had received quotations from five insurance companies for providing disability insurance for employees. They are under study, and he plans to make a recommendation at the next meeting.

Mr. Christopher stated that he had attended a meeting of the Blacksburg High School Athletic Association, and the members were urging completion of the grading at this site, as the space is so badly needed by the pupils for physical education. Mr. Hale reported that work had been progressing at the site, but vandalism had put the bulldozer out of operation twice, and the weather had delayed completion of the project. The change of plan requested by the Association has delayed the work also.

Mr. Dunkenberger moved that the Board go into executive session for discussion of a personnel problem, seconded by Mr. Graybeal and passed.

Mr. Sutphin moved, seconded by Dr. Graybeal and passed that the resignation of Mr. Roy Hilt, teacher at Christiansburg High School be accepted.

January 18, 1972

A regular meeting of Montgomery County School Board was held on the above date at 7:30 p.m. with all members present except Rev. H.E. Poff, who was absent because of illness. Supt. Hale, Messrs. Stevens, Earp and Guilliams were also present.

Mr. Hale moved, seconded by Mr. Christopher and passed that minutes for the regular meeting of January 4 and special meeting of January 11 be approved without reading, since copies had been furnished to each member.

Mr. Omar Ross, Principal of Christiansburg High School, presented a request for funds on a matching basis with the Demon Boosters Club for the following proposed improvements on the Christiansburg High School football field:

Mr. Bud Devens of the Blacksburg High School Athletic Foundation expressed the dissatisfaction of this group at the progress made on the grading for the new athletic field at this school. The School Board was requested to secure such professional services as needed to complete the grading. If this cannot be done, the Association requested permission to enter into a contract with an organization that is able to do this, in view of the need for seeding by March 15. This grading can be completed in two or three days.

Mr. Sutphin moved that the Association's proposal be accepted to grade the football field at no cost to the School Board under the condition that it will be a contract entered into by the School Board with the grading contractor for grading and necessary tile for drainage. Dr. Graybeal seconded the motion.

Mr. Charles Beasley stated that he felt a detailed study of all extracurricular offerings taking into consideration the number of children served by each should be made. He felt first priority should be given to upgrading instruction, and that the entire needs of the county should be given in-depth study before a commitment is made on improving athletic facilities at either school.

Mrs. Mary Devens spoke in behalf of the improvement of athletic facilities, stating that if more seats are available, more fans will be interested in attending the games and more revenue will be forthcoming. She emphasized the importance of wholesome activities for youth.

Mrs. Marilyn Pavlick asked for clarification of the procedures in improving the Blacksburg field, and was given a review of the plan-

Mr. Joe Rusek, football coach at Christiansburg High School, spoke in behalf of the improved facilities, stating that if something was not done, some of the sports other than football would have to be cancelled.

Mr. Al Houston asked if the revenue from the games would be enough really to assist the School Board, and stated that he felt improvement in flexibility of classroom instruction was a major item that needed study, based on his second grade daughter's experience at Beeks School.

Mr. Sale asked for the superintendent's opinion. Mr. Hale stated that he was more concerned over the proper mixing of the topsoil and seeding than he was the rough grading. Mr. Devens stated that agronomy personnel at VPI SU had agreed that the topsoil available at the new Blacksburg High School site was of a sufficient grade that no mixing would be necessary.

Mr. Dunkenberger stated that the request from the Board of Supervisors for funds for completion of new buildings and additions to existing ones had not yet received favorable consideration, and he felt this should be given priority.

The Chairman called for a vote on the motion, and it carried.

Request of the Elliston-Lafayette 1st. and second grades for use of a bus so that they can attend the Shrine Circus in Salem on January 29 at 10:00 a.m., and request of Shawsville High School for use of a bus for a team to appear on Klassroom Kwiz, T.V. show in Roanoke, both recommended by the superintendent, were approved on motion by Dr. Graybeal, seconded by Mr. Sale and passed.

Mr. Hale reported that after much study of the proposals of companies for furnishing long-term disability insurance for employees of the School Board by him and a disinterested consultant, he recommends acceptance of the plan offered by the Shenandoah Life Insurance Company, based on the total benefits and the local service accessible. Mr. Dunkenberger moved that the School Board enter a contract with Shenandoah for purchase of disability insurance for the remainder of the fiscal year and the following full year. seconded by Mr. Sale and passed.

Mr. Hale reported that the architects were still not ready to make a recommendation on the low bid for construction of Christiansburg High School

with regard to the two alternates and the movable walls. He hopes to be ready for further discussion in time for the first February meeting.

A written report on the status of retroactive pay since repeal of the Wage-Price Freeze was given to each member. Approval has not yet been granted for this pay to be given to the employees.

Mr. George Guilliams, Supervisor of Vocational Education, presented a resume of all programs in the county being wholly or partly reimbursed by the Federal Government. These include the following:

Title I, ESEA, improvement of reading, began March 1966.

Title II. Improvement of libraries.

Title III. Supplementary Service to the School system-guidance- 3 counselors, work with disadvantaged pupils in grades 7, 8 and 9.

Headstart - summer program for disadvantaged pre-school children who will enter first grade in the fall.

Lookout - identification of children in early years who will probably encounter social and academic difficulties, and assistance in avoiding such.

Adult Basic Education - For school dropouts or a person who is functioning below a 9th grade level.

Adult General Education - for persons who can attain on 9th grade level or above. This can lead to a high school equivalency diploma.

Vocational Act of 1963 - pre-vocational oourses for disadvantaged children in 7th, 8th and 9th grades.

NDEA - 50% of funds to buy equipment and instructional materials.

P.L. 874 - aid to school divisions designated as federally impacted because of large number of children of parents who are employed on federal property.

School Lunch Program

The following are under study and it is hoped that they can be begun by the next school year:

Handicapped - for preschool training of children 3 to 5 years of age, so they will be able to enter a classroom situation satisfactorily.

Readiness - for five year olds, to insure that they receive the proper instruction to get them started in such a way that they can continue to perform at a satisfactory pace.

Total Federal funds anticipated for this fiscal year amount to \$787,956.09.

Mr. Hale reported that a special library grant has been received in the amount of \$1000.00 each for the Riner and Shawsville Elementary Schools, and \$2000. for the Gilbert Linkous School. The latter is based on the large enrollement at this school, and the small percentage of books per child at present in the library.

Mr. Hale requested approval of the Board for request to be made to the Highway Department for exits to Shawsville and to be indicated on

Interstate 81 which bypasses this community. This approval was granted on motion by Mr. Christopher, seconded by Mr. Dunkenberger and passed.

Dr. Graybeal moved that the Board adjourn to executive session for the discussion of pupil expulsion and land easement, seconded by Mr. Sale and passed.

The case of Eugenia Lynn Farrow, a student at Blacksburg High School and daughter of Mrs. Saxton Grade, was discussed by the Board. Moved by Dr. Graybeal that Mr. Gray's action in suspending Eugenia from riding a Montgomery County School bus be confirmed until further action is taken by the board, seconded by Mr. Dunkenberger and passed.

Mr. Sale moved that three easements representing three parcels of land in front of Shawsville Elementary and Shawsville High School be granted to the Montgomery County Public Service Authority, seconded by Mr. Walters and passed.

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February 8, 1972

A regular meeting of Montgomery County School Board was called to order at 7:30 p.m., in the School Board Office. Members prsent: J. R. Stewart, Chairman; H. C. Graybeal, Roy L. Sutphin, T. M. Dunkenberger, R. E. Christopher, Glenn D. Walters, R. E. Mathena, and Albin Sale. H. E. Poff was absent. Also present were Supt. Hale, E. L. King, George Guilliams, B. E. Stevens and J. E. Earp.

Members of the Board of Supervisors were present; the purpose of which was a discussion of current building programs with the new members of the Board of Supervisors. Supt. Hale reviewed the 1969 Building Program, Phase I: Riner Elementary, Shawsville Elementary, Blacksburg High and Christiansburg High Schools.

Then Supt. Hale Entered into a more detailed discussion of Phase II, the 1970 Building Program. Mills and Obenshain are the architects for:

- 1. Addition to Beeks
- 2. Addition to Linkous
- 3. New Blacksburg Elementary
- 4. New Christiansburg Elementary
- 5. Addition to Elliston-Lafayette

Smithey and Boynton are the architects for:

- 1. Shawsville High addition
- 2. Auburn High addition
- 3. Price's Fork addition
- 4. Belview addition
- 5. Bethel addition.

Various questions were asked by members of the Board of Supervisors conderning the program. After considerable discussion by the members of both Boards, the Board of Supervisors agreed to discuss the various methods of financing the program at their next meeting to be held on February 9 at 7:30 p.m.

Moved by Mr. Sale, seconded by Mr. Dunkenberger, that since copies of minutes of meetings of January 4, 11 and 18 were in the hands of Board members that they be approved without reading. Motion passed.

Mr. Ross, Principal of Christiansburg High School, appeared before the Board requesting approval of the project presented previously for redevelopment of the High School Athletic Field. Moved by Mr. Sutphin that a representative of the Board appear before the Board of Supervisors asking for an appropriation of \$19,000. for Christiansburg High School field. Seconded by Dr. Graybeal. Motion failed.

Moved by Mr. Sale, seconded by Mr. Christopher, that the Board permit Christiansburg High School to proceed with the necessary construction of the essential work at no cost to the School Board and under the condition that it will be a contract entered into by the School Board with the firms performing the work. Motion passed.

Mr. Jim King appeared before the Board in connection with the Centennial observance at VPISU and requested that the School Board declare a holiday from 12:01 on May 23, 1972. Moved by Dr. Graybeal that the holiday be approved with the administration and principals setting the hour. Seconded by Mr. Sutphin and passed.

Supt. Hale read a letter informing the Board that Mr. Kenneth Motley was resigning from Kinsey, Motley, Shane and Mills, however, this would not affect the work of theirs on Montgomery County Schools.

The Board granted approval for Victory Temple Church to use Christiansburg Primary School for a Gospel Sing on April 21, 1972 at 7:30 p.m.

Supt. Hale read a letter from the Health Department concerning tuberculin test program. Moved by Mr. Sale, seconded by Mr. Christopher and passed that the Board approve the program for Montgomery County employees during April and May. Motion passed.

Board approved Christiansburg High School Stage Band trip to Martinsville on February 11 and 12, and Christiansburg High School Senior class trip to New York - date to be fixed later.

Moved by Mr. Dunkenberger, seconded by Dr. Graybeal and passed that the basketball tournament be approved for Blacksburg High School on March 22-25, 1972. This is sponsored by the Blacksburg High School Athletic Foundation. It is understood that administration and payment of expenses be carried out as outlined by Mr. Gray in his request letter of Feb. 7, 1972. Motion passed.

Information on the State Board budget was presented to the Board.

Moved by Mr. Dunkenberger, seconded by Dr. Christopher that the following bills and disbursements be approved for payment:

Operating Fund - \$117,675.88, check nos. 10055 through 10310

January 1972 payroll - \$398,262.05, check nos. 3182 through 3875

Moved by Mr. Sale, seconded by Mr. Dunkenberger that the Board go into executive session to discuss personnel and expulsion.

Supt. Hale read a letter from Mr. Beasley concerning his child's being hit by a bus driver. No action was taken, awaiting the outcome of the case in court.

Letters of Rev. Kenneth B. Wright concerning reinstatement to Christiansburg High School of Sherwood Farrow and Donald R. Burks were read. Mr. Hale was instructed to reply to letters and to say that upon proper application they would be considered for reinstatement at summer school.

The following Local Advisory Committee for Handicapped Children was endorsed:

Mr, James Williamson from Christiansburg, Mrs. R. Round from Blacksburg, Mrs. Alice Alley from Auburn, and Mrs. Frank Doyle from Shawsville. Mrs. Jeanette Hindle, Supervisor of Special Education, was designated to contact them to ascertain their willingness to serve in this capacity.

The Board agreed that it does not want to mame any school for anyone at this time.

The Montgomery County School Board met in regular session on the above date at 7:30 p.m. with the following members present: T. M. Dunkenberger, Vice Chairman, presiding; R. E. Christopher, R. E. Mathena, Albin Sale, Roy L. Sutphin, Glenn Walters. H. E. Poff and H. C. Graybeal were absent. J. R. Stewart arrived near the end of the meeting. Supt. Hale, Messrs. King and Stevens were present.

Mr. Sale moved that minutes for the meeting of February 8 be approved without reading, since members had been furnished with copies. Mr. Mathena seconded the motion and it was passed.

Mr. Thomas Teates, Vice President of Belview P.T.A., presented a list of problems and deficiences at the Belview School, and requested that the School Board take action to alleviate them as soon as possible. They are as follows:

Heating system needs regulation - some rooms overheated.

Water heater causes overheating in warm weather.

Lighting in six classrooms issinadequate.

Number of desks and tables in poor repair and need replacement.

Rest room facilities inadequate with exception of grades 1 and 2.

Expansion needed - the two kindergarten rooms proposed for addition, and removel of 6th and 7th grades to new Christiansburg Middle School will not increase the space to accommodate proposed increase in enrollment.

Request retention of mobile classroom. unit to house music and art classroom.

Multipurpose room needs enlarging. Physical education classes are limited in use of this room because of extended lunch period to accommodate large number of pupils.

The Chairman expressed appreciation for the report of the PTA and the delegation was assured that the problems would be taken under advisement. Mr. Mathena moved that a member or members of the School Board, someone from the central office staff, and Mrs. Overstreet, Principal of Belview School, meet to view the situation and discuss it, and report back to the School Board. Mr. Sale seconded the motion and it was passed. Mr. Mathena was named as the member from the School Board, and Mr. Hale will designate someone from his office.

Mr. Douglas Pillsbury was present to request that the School Board grant approval for publicity to be given in the schools to the Hike against Hunger which will be held on April 22. The success of the program last year was excellent, and Mr. Hale recommended that the group be permitted to publicize the Hike in the high schools only. Mr. Sutphin moved that the request be granted for the high schools only, seconded by Mr. Mathena and passed unanimously.

Request of Belview PTA wor use of the Christiansburg High School gyms nasium for a basketball game was approved on recommendation of the superintendent. Mr. Ross, high school principal, has stated that March 10 is the only date available for this purpose.

Mrs. Jill Graybeal, County Music Supervisor, presented an interesting and informative discussion of the music program and curriculum in the schools. She showed textbooks and musical instruments used in the instruction and gave demonstrations of how these are used, along with some statistics concerning present instructional personnel and number of students involved in the programs.

Mr. Hale reported on the action of the Board of Supervisors in approval of funds in the amount of \$4,924,391.00 which is the architects' estimate of the amount needed to complete Phase II of the building program. Mr. Hale stated that he is working with the architects to expedite completion of working drawings do that they can be submitted to Richmond for approval at the earliest possible date.

The Christiansburg High School Athletic Booster Club has presented their request for funds directly to the Board of Supervisors. The Board of Supervisors, in turn, has requested a meeting with the School Board to discuss the matter and aspects of funding. Mr. Hale reported that this meeting has been tentatively set for March 8. It was the consensus of the Board that the members should visit the sites to be discussed and review the work reugested, before this meeting, so that they can be better prepared to discuss it. This tour of athletic facilities is scheduled for Saturday, February 26, beginning at 9 a.m. at the School Board office.

Mr. Hale reported that the separate bidding of movable partitions for Christiansburg High School is still under study by the architects with the Roanoke Engineering Sales Co. The gneral contractor, J. E. Davis and Sons, has agreed to hold the bid on the parking area until it can be determined if funds will be forthcoming from Driver Education to be used for this purpose. This portion of the work can not be done until near the completion of the entire job. The architects recommend that the access drive to the Christiansburg High School be re-bid because of the excessive quotation made by the general contractor.

Mr. Mathena moved that the School Board express appreciation to the Board of Supervisors for their prompt action in approval of funds requested for completion of the building program, seconded by Mr. Walters and passed unanimously.

The Superintendent reported that installations of equipment, etc., in the Riner and Shawsville schools was progressing rapidly whis week, and he felt somewhat encouraged that the pupils might be moved into them very soon.

Mr. Hale reported that representatives of the three school divisions which operated the now extinct New River Vocational Technical School had met to divide the equipment. Montgomery County School Board was allotted the automobile mechanics equipment, part of the drafting equipment, and part of the electronics equipment, which totalled in value \$49,041. On recommendation of the Superintendent, Mr. Sutphin moved that this division be accepted, seconded by Mr. Sale and passed unanimously.

The Local Advisory Committee on Special Education for Handicapped Children recommended at the last meeting of the Board was appointed on motion by Mr. Sutphin, seconded by Mr. Mathena and passed. The members have agreed to serve and they are as follows:

Christiansburg area - Mr. James Williamson Blacksburg area - Mrs. Roswell Round Auburn area - Mrs. Alice Alley Shawsville area - Mrs. Frank Doyle.

Request of Mrs. Graybeal, Music Supervisor, for 732 students from the various county schools to attend a Student Concert by the Roanoke Symphony at the Roanoke Civic Center on March 7 at 10:00 a.m. was approved on motion by Mr. Walters, seconded by Mr. Mathena and passed.

Request of Project Advance instructor for his students to visit the Dublin Mills to study work skills on February 28 was approved on motion by Mr. Sale, seconded by Mr. Walters and passed.

Mr. King gave a review of how the Governor's proposed budget for education would affect Montgomery County. There is a proposal that funds be allocated on basis of Average Daily Membership instead of Average Daily Attendance. True values in Montgomery County have increased to the point that a larger amount of funds would be required to be furnished locally.

It has been proposed that some future meetings of the School Board be held in the new school buildings. Several members expressed the feeling that this would be unwise, as it would be difficult to publicize the meeting places so that citizens desiring to attend would be advised. Also, it was felt that information in the School Board office might be needed and would not be available if the meetings were held elsewhere. Therefore, it was agreed that it would be best to continue holding the regular meetings in the School Board Office.

Mr. Sale moved that the Board go into Execttive session for discussion of pupil expulsion, seconded by Mr. Mathena and passed.

After reading a letter from Mr. Curtis Gray, Principal, Blacksburg High School, recommending expulsion of Thomas Allen Davis, Supt. Hale requested that the recommendation be accepted. Moved by Mr. Christopher, seconded by Mr. Sale and passed that Thomas Allen Davis be expelled for the remainder of this year in the interest of the welfare and efficiency of the school.

The Board agreed that its policy of naming schools after geographical locations was good. They would be receptive to naming a gym or auditorium for an individual.

Check No. 10311 in the amount of \$203.43 to the Sheriff of Montgomery County to cover a garnishment for Eldred Radford was unanimously approved for payment.

The Montgomery County School Board met in regular session on the above date at 7:30 p.m. with the following members present: J.R. Stewart, Chairman; T.M. Dunkenberger, Albin Sale, H.C. Graybeal, R.E. Mathena, G.D. Walters, R.E. Christopher, R.L. Sutphine H.E. Poff was absent. Supt. Hale, Messrs. King, Guilliams, Stevens and Quesenberry were present.

The meeting was opened with prayer by Mr. Guilliams.

Mr. Christopher moved that minutes for the meeting of February 22 be approved without reading since each member had received a copy, seconded by Mr. Mathena and passed.

Mr. Shane of Kinsey, Shane and Mills was present to report on construction of the new Christiansburg High School. The general contractor has moved on the site with his equipment and is ready to begin work. The School Board voted to withhold action on one of the options in the bid, and this option contains construction of water mains to the site, which will be necessary to complete as construction proceeds. Mr. Shane stated that he had checked the estimate of the contractor (\$19,124.) and found it to be in line, so he recommended that the Board approve a change order. Mr. Sutphin moved that the recommendation of the architect be accepted for laying of the 6 and 8 inch water mains, seconded by Dr. Graybeal and passed unanimously.

Mr. Shane reported that final inspection of the Riner and Shawsville Elementary schools would begin at 9:30 a.m., March 8, and he hoped some of the Board members would be able to be present.

He recommended that demountable partitions for the new Christiansburg High School be purchased from the same company which is furnishing them for the Blacksburg High School - Roanoke Engineering Sales - for a cost of \$26,335. Dr. Graybeal moved that this recommendation be accepted, seconded by, Mr. Dunkenberger and passed.

School bus bids were opened and tabulated by Mr. Stevens and Mr. Quesenberry. Low bid of Blue Bird Body Company at \$3100.00, and Homer Cox Ford for chassis at \$3604.08, for the five 54-passenger buses; and low bid of Ward Body Company at \$3452.48 and Homer Cox Ford at \$4552.10 for the three 66-passenger buses, were accepted unanimously on motion by Mr. Sutphin, seconded by Dr. Graybeal.

Mr. Stevens was requested to look into the feasibility and cost of installing padding on the backs of seats on the old buses which do not have it.

Letter was read from Mr. Richard T. Howerton, Pastor, Blacksburg Baptist Church, requesting permission to publicize in the schools the Augsburger Crusade to be held in the VPISU Coliseum the last of April. Approval was granted for this publicity to be given in the high schools only.

The Superintendent requested approval for erection of a storage shed on the School Bus Garage site for housing tractors, mowers, and other equipment which have had to be left outside for lack of space. Cost of building ... materials would be approximately \$3300.00 with supervision from School Board

personnel, and work to be done by the same, with probably some additional workers. Mr. Christopher moved that approval be granted, seconded by Mr. Sale and passed.

This is an outgrowth of the evaluation of this school three years ago, and the Superintendent recommended granting the request. Mr. Christopher moved that approval be given, seconded by Mr. Sutphin and passed unanimously.

It was moved by Mr. Sutphin, seconded by Mr. Dunkenberger and passed, that the School Board request the Board of Supervisors of Montgomery County for authorization to secure a temporary loan of \$100.000. for the purpose of proceeding with planning and developing of Phase II of the 1970 Building Program.

Special Meeting March 14, 1972

The Montgomery County School Board met in special session on the above date at 7:30 p.m. in its office with the following members present:

J. R. Stewart, Chairman; H. C. Graybeal, R. L. Sutphin, T. M. Dunkenberger,
Glenn Walters, R. E. Christopher. R. E. Mathena, Albin Sale and H. E.

Poff were absent. Also present were: R. T. Hale, E. L. King, B. E.

Stevens.

Dr. Stewart called the meeting to order and welcomed the visitors. Supt. Hale presented the proposals for landscaping the new Riner and Shawsville Elementary Schools by Blue Ridge Nursery. The quote was \$5,215.15 for the Riner site and \$5,150.70 for the Shawsville site. After 3 weeks has elapsed the soil must be mulched and the cost would be \$750.00 per school extra. Mr. Sutphin moved that the bids be accepted, seconded by Dr. Graybeal and passed.

Supt. Hale presented plans showing the layout of the sites and additions to the Shawsville and Auburn High Schools. The build-ups showed the existing buildings and the relation of the new additions to the existing buildings.

Supt. Hale then gave some attention to the development of the budget.

Moved by Dr. Grapbeal, seconded by Mr. Christopher that the development of the Blacksburg High School football field be approved in line with previously established Board policy and at no cost to the School Board. Motion passed.

Dr. Graybeal expressed his feeling that the Board should assume responsibility for developing athletic facilities at all the high schools of the county as has been the case in music and other areas.

A general discussion of public education in Montgomery County was engaged in by many of those present.

The meeting then adjourned.

The Montgomery County School Board met in regular session on the above date at 7:30 p.m. with the following members present: J. R. Stewart, Chairman; T. M. Dunkenberger, Albin Sale, H. C. Graybeal, R. L. Sutphin, G. D. Walters, R. E. Christopher. R. E. Mathena and H. E. Poff were absent. Also present were Supt. Hale, E. L. King, B. E. Stevens, J. E. Earp and G. C. Guilliams.

Minutes for the regular meeting of March 7 and special meetings of March 8 and 14 were approved without reading, since members had been furnished with copies.

A letter was read from the New River Valley Association for Retarded Children. Inc., requesting that two additional members be eelected to serve on the Advisory "Board" established by the School Board in connection with Special Education, and that this Association be permitted to recommend members from its organization to serve. Mr. Hale explained that the committee recently appointed by the School Board was in no way a "Board" but the members would serve purely in an advisory capacity in Montgomery County only. The above-mentioned Association is a regional organization serving Montgomery and Pulaski Counties and the City of Radford; also, it would serve a broader scope of Exceptional Children than mentally retarded only. The committee was formed on the recommendation of the Special Education Service of the State Department of Education, as outlined in a bulletin entitled "Services for Exceptional Children: A Guide for Program Improvement." It was the concensus of the School Board that the Association for Retarded Children had misunderstood the purpose of the Advisory Committee, and that the Superintendent should write a letter to them explaining the guidelines under which the committee was appointed and indicating that any of their members would be welcomed at meetings of the committee.

Mr. Stevens reported on quotations for the body of a wrecker for which bids were authorized by the School Board. Shepherds Auto Supply of Roanoke has quoted \$6824.04, and Marion Auto Parts, \$9091.29, less 5%. He recommended that low bid be accepted to that order could be placed, but requested that he given further time to study the proposals for Ford and Chevrolet chassis before a decision is made on the chassis. Dr. Graybeal moved that the low bid for the body be accepted, seconded by Mr. Sale and passed.

Mr. Stevens reported that Blue Bird Body Company is the only company that makes seat back padding for buses. He has been quoted a price of \$7.09 per seat. Total cost would be around \$6500.00 to install this padding on about 45 of the older buses. Mr. Stevens was requested to secure a sample of the actual material used, and the Board would make a final decision at a later meeting.

Mr. Stevens reported that a re-study of the bus situation revealed a need for more buses than were authorized for purchase during this year. The reason for this is an increase in the number of children to be transported, causing five additional buses to be added to the routes this year. He recommended that the Board authorize purchase of 1 additional 54-passenger bus, and 2 additional 66-passenger buses; at the low bids quoted. This was approved on motion My Mr. Sutphin, seconded by Dr. Graybeal and passed.

 The Superintendent reported that the Board of Supervisors has authorized the School Board to borrow up to \$100,000.00 as needed, to pay the Architect's and Engineers' fees for Phase II of the School Building Program. It is felt that about \$60,000.00 will be needed at present and this loan will be secured immediately.

Each Board member was presented with three sections of the revised policy bulletin being prepared by Dr. Rutrough for their study and recommended revision or approval. One of the sections is on Student Teachers, and Mr. Hale requested that this be studied for immediate action since it is becoming more of a problem because of the teacher training institutions located near and within Montgomery County.

Purchase of the Willard property, containing approximately .7 acres on . Wilson Avenue in Blacksburg, adjacent to the site of the new Blacksburg elementary school, at \$70000.00 was approved on motion by Mr. Christopher, seconded by Mr. Sutphin and passed.

Mr. Earp presented a suggested revision of the School Calendar to make up the four days lost because of snow. The revision, approved on motion by Mr. Sutphin, seconded by Dr. Graybeal and passed, is as follows:

April 20 and 21 scheduled as teacher work days, to be used
as regular school days

April 22 will be a work day for teachers

Two students from Blacksburg High School to Contemporary Arts exhibit in Richmond on March 27, 28 and 29.

Request of band students at Blacksburg and Christiansburg High Schools to have a volleyball and basketball game on Saturday, March 25 at 9 a.m. at Blacksburg High School was approved on motion by Mr. Dunkenberger, seconded by Mr. Sutphin and passed.

Students in the choral groups at Blacksburg High School have raised \$400. toward the purchase of a piano, and the Blacksburg-High PTA has contributed \$200. They are requesting the School Board to pay an additional \$200.00. Mr. Christopher moved that this amount be appropriated, seconded by Dr. Graybeal and passed. Mr. Dunkenberger expressed the feeling that such inttruments should be purchased by the School Board entirely, and Mr. Hale stated that this goal has been set, but would not be reached immediately.

Senior Citizens of Christiansburg Community requested permission to hold a wrestling match at Christiansburg High School gymnasium in late April or early May. It has been the feeling of the school and administrative staff that such events take quite a bit of money out of the community (this one would be sponsored by the Roanoke Athletic Association) and Mr. Hale stated that this had been the feeling of citizens in general when such activities had been proposed in the past. The Board decided to defer action until further information could be secured about the feeling of various organizations concerning it.

Dr. Graybeal moved, seconded by Mr. Dunkenberger, and passed, that an institutional membership in the American Association of School Administrators be approved in the amount of \$150.00 per year.

The store building in Shawsville which has been used for housing school pupils is leased through April, but the pupils have been moved to the new Shawsville Elementary School. Mrs. Verna S. Pearman is requesting the Board to sub-lease the building to her. The Superintendent reported that a few items were still stored there, and the Superintendent was authorized to negotiate with Mrs. Pearman and Dr. Smith, from whom the building is leased.

Mr. King reviewed the receipts section of the budget, explaining how certain state funds are allowated, as well as federal and local. This portion of the budget cannot be completed until further definite information is received from the State Department of Education, which it is hoped will be in the next few days.

Mr. Hale reviewed the expenditures section of the Budget. It was agreed to set funds for libraries at \$50,000.

It was reported from returns of the election held this date regarding a change in the method of selecting school board members that a large majority of citizens voted for the school board members to be appointed by the Board of Supervisors rather than the present method of their selection by a School Electoral Board appointed by the Circuit Court Judge.

The Board will meet March 28 to complete its budget study.

Moved by Mr. Dunkenberger, seconded by Mr. Sale, that the Board go into executive session to discuss land acquisition and releasing two students from school. Motion passed.

Donald Ratcliff and David Barker were requested to be excused from school attendance by consent of their parents with concurrence of their principal, the Superintendent of Schools and Judge of the Juvenile Court.

It was proposed that an item be placed in the budget for procuring land with special limitations. Approved on motion by Dr. Graybeal, seconded by Mr. Sutphin and passed.

In open session, it was moved by Mr. Supphin that the Board grant the Judge's request by excusing Donald Ratcliff and David Barker from compulsory school attendance, seconded by Mr. Dunkenberger and passed.

The Montgomery County School Board met in special session on the above date at 7:30 p.m. with the following members present: J.R. Stewart, Chairman; T. M. Dunkenberger, Albin Sale and B. E. Stevens were present. JR. E. Mathena and H. E. Poff were absent. Dr. Noy weel present.

Mr. Shane of the Architects requested permission to advertise for bids on the vocational section of Christiansburg High School to be received on May 2, 1972 at 2 p.m. Mr. Dunkenberger moved approval, seconded by Dr. Graybeal and passed.

Mr. Mills presented a change order for approval in the amount of \$4793.67 for Blacksburg High School. This covered electrical work in connection with underfloor ducts and wall switch control in a central position for the business department, and some changes in the electrical service to the science department This was approved on motion by Mr. Sutphin, seconded by Mr. Christopher and passed.

Mr. Mills also reported that plans had been approved in Richmond for the new Christiansburg and Blacksburg Elementary Schools, and requested that bids be received by the School Board on April 25 at 2 p.m. This was approved on motion by Mr. Christopher, seconded by Mr. Sutphin and passed.

Mr. Stevens presented bids on chassis for the service truck approved for purchase. Teel Chevrolet quoted \$6605.26, and Homer Cox Ford, \$6366.63. Dr. Graybeal moved that low bid of Homer Cox Ford be accepted, seconded by Mr. Christopher and passed.

Mr. Stevens reported that his study of the body forthis truck revealed that a larger size body costing \$400.00 more would be better for the purpose. This extra expenditure, making a total of \$7224.00 from Shepherds Auto Supply, Inc., was approved on motion by Dr. Graybeal, Seconded by Mr. Sutphin and passed.

Mr. Hale presented a proposal of Stanley R. Cupp at \$2700.00 for paving the parking area at new Shawsville Elementary School, and from Shawsville Stone Company at \$2817.50. Low quote of Stanley R. Cupp was accepted on motion by Mr. Dunkenberger, seconded by Mr. Sale and passed.

The state law requiring smallpox immunization has been questioned by physicians who no longer feel that this is necessary for every child. Therefore, the State Department of Education and the State Health Commissioner have approved local school board action which will require every pupil, within ten days after entering a public school, to (1) furnish a certificate from a licensed physician certifying that such pupil has been successfully vaccinated for smallpox; or, (2) furnish a written statement from a licensed physician stating that in his opinion vaccination with smallpox vaccine is contraindicated, or (3) furnish a written statement from the parent or guardian that the administration of immunizing agents conflicts with his religious tenets or practices.

The above requirement was unanimously adopted as a policy of Montgomery County School Board, with motion for adoption being made by Mr. Dunkenberger, seconded by Mr. Sutphin.

Mr. Hale reported that the temporary loan approved by the Board of Supervisors had been obtained from the First Virginia Bank of the Southwest in the amount of \$60,000. at 2.30% interest.

Dr. Graybeal moved, seconded by Mr. Walters and passed, that 1970 School Building Fund checks no. 7 and 8, amounting to \$57,656.28, be approved for payment.

Copies of the proposed 1972-73 budget were presented to each member, and reviewed item by item by Mr. King. Mr. Sutphin moved, seconded by Dr. Graybeal that the budget in the amount of \$6,102,177.84 be approved with the following revisions:

17a-102a Compensation of Superintendent - \$16,650.00 17a-102b Compensation of Assistant Superintendent - \$17,860.00 Other Contractual Services and Expenses - \$1349.84. (These are estimates only, and do not necessarily represent the actual salary which will be set at a later date.)

Letter from the Virginia Tech Chapter of the American Dairy Science Association was read, in which they requested permission to use the Blacksburg High School cafeteria for a banquet on May 13. Mr. Sutphin moved that the request be granted, seconded by Mr. Mathena and passed, with details and fees to be worked out with the school principal.

On motion by Mr. Sutphin, seconded by Mr. Walters and passed unanimously, the following policy was adopted:

It shall be the policy of the Montgomery County School Board that there shall be no alteration(s), addition(s), and/or adaptation(s) of the real property, utilities and services within the schools of Montgomery County until the Board is in a position to accomplish them in the schools on a planned basis in which the alteration(s), addition(s), and/or Adaptation(s) are desirable. Such changes thall then be made only with the approval of a registered architect or engineer, and the School Building Service of the State Department of Education.

Mr. Stevens presented a sample of the school bus seat back padding previously discussed. He stated it has been found that it does not fit the Ward body, which comprises the major Eportion of the buses now in operation. The Blue Bird Body Company has assured him they will study the problem.

Bids were opened and studied for a 3/4T truck to be used for plumbing and electrical repair service. The bids were as follows:

It was decided to dispense with the April 18 meeting of the School Board, since the Superintendent and Mr. Dunkenberger will be attending the National School Boards Association meeting.

Mr. Sutphin expressed the feeling athat a citizens' information manager should be appointed, to see that news stories, such as opening of the new schools and progress of construction of the new schools, reach the newspapers for publication. Mr. Don Harrison of the Roanoke Times who was present spoke in favor of this arrangement, stating that it was not always possible for reporters to have time to cover events as they happen. Further study will be given to this proposal.

Dr. Stewart asked if the matter of outdoor playground equipment for the new elementary schools had been given consideration, and was assured by the Superintendent that the Director of Instruction was proceeding with planning and purchasing this equipment for both indoors and outdoors, with emphasis being given to the physical education aspect, rather than entertainment only.

It was felt by the Board members that the policies in process of preparation should be carefully discussed and a meeting was tertatively set for April 25 if it is found that Dr. Rutrough has material ready in sufficient quantity to justify it.

Mr. Christopher moved that the Board go into executive session for the discussion of sewer easement and land negotiation, seconded by Dr. Graybeal and bassed.

The Board authorized Superintendent Hale to instruct the School Board attorney, Mr. Allen Sowder, to negotiate with Mr. Goldsmith for the purchase of the Paskowski property at Riner and to offer up to \$5500.00. If rejected, then condemnation is to be initiated as soon as possible.

The Board returned to open session.

Dr. Graybeal moved, seconded by Mr. Sale, that the three sewer easements as outlined in the Riner Sewer Project Map by R. E. Huddle, III, at the two schools in Riner, be granted to the Montgomery County Public Service Authority for the construction of public sewer service to both schools. Motion passed.

MONTGOMERY COUNTY SCHOOL BOARD MEETING - April 25, 1972

The Montgomery County School Board met on the above date at 7:30 p.m. with the following members present: J.R. Stewart, Chairman; T.M. Dunkenberger, Roy L. Sutphin, H.C. Graybeal, Glenn Walters, Albin Sale. R. E. Mathena and R. E. Christopher were absent. Supt. Hale, E. L. King and B. E. Stevens were present.

Minutes for the meeting of April 4 were approved without reading on motion by Mr. Dunkenberger, seconded by Mr. Walters and passed unanimously. Copies had been mailed to each member.

Mr. Mills reviewed the bids for the new Christiansburg and Blacksburg Elementary Schools which had been received this date at 2:00 p.m. After some discussion, Mr. Dunkenberger moved that Graves Construction Company, low bidder for the Blacksburg Elementary School, be awarded this contract without alternates one and two, in the amount of \$845,000,00. Motion carried.

Mr. Sutphin moved that low bid of Gallimore, Inc., for Christiansburg Elementary School in the amount of \$973,450.00 without alternates one and two be accepted, seconded by Dr. Graybeal and passed.

Mr. Hale opened two bids on pavement at Riner Elementary School as follows:

Play Area Parking lot and area to be repaired \$2730.24 \$508.00 \$2192.55 \$400.00

Dr. Graybeal moved that low bid of Stanley Cupp be accepted, seconded by Mr. Sale and passed.

Mr. Hale reported that the Public Service Authority will be ready to furnish water to the Riner School on April 28. The pupils have been moved into this school and are returning to the high school for lunch.

Concern was expressed by the Board members that the cafeterias at this school and also at Shawsville Elementary School have not been completed so that they can be used. The Superintendent was requested to notify the architect that the Board is quite anxious that the work be completed immediately so that the expense of transporting pupils to the former schools can be stopped.

Mr. Hale reported that the official application for funds for the vocational wing of the new Christiansburg High School from the State Department and Federal Government has been approved in an approximate amount of \$509,913.00, or 40% of the bid price. Bid opening for this portion of the building will be received at 2 p.m. on May 2.

The following school trips were approved on motion by Dr. Graybeal, seconded by Mr. Sutphin and passed:

A letter was read regarding a hearing to be held on rezoning of the property between Gables Shopping Center and Margaret Beeks School in Blacksburg for multi-family housing. The School Board felt that they would offer no objection to this rezoning so no action was taken.

Mr. Hale reported that Rev. H. E. Poff had submitted his resignation from the School Board for reasons of health. A resolution is to be prepared expressing regret for this necessity and appreciation for his service to be presented at the next meeting of the Board.

Check Nos. 10831 and 10832 in the amount of \$10,187.00 from the operating fund were approved on motion by Mr. Sutphin, seconded by Mr. Sale and passed.

Mr. Sutphin expressed the feeling that the new schools should be named officially immediately, and a discussion followed. Mr. Sutphin moved that the policy of the School Board be that new and re-designated schools will be named after a geographic location, seconded by Dr. Graybeal and passed.

Mr. Dunkenberger moved that the meeting adjourn to executive session for the discussion of land acquisition and a personnel problem, seconded by Mr. Sale and passed.

No action was required from the executive session, therefore the meeting adjour following this session. Chair.

The Montgomery County School Board met in regular session on the above date at 8:00 p.m. with all members present. Supt. Hale, E. L. King, B. E. Stevens and R. C. Quesenberry were present.

The meeting was opened with prayer by Mr. E. L. King.

Minutes for the meeting of April 25 were approved without reading, on motion by Mr. Sale, seconded by Mr. Mathena and passed, since a copy had been mailed to each member.

A delegation of teachers and parents from the Riner area were present with Dr. Jack Clark as spokesman. He requested that they be advised of the progress of action on the resolution presented by this group regarding the naming of the Riner Elementary School for Manuel Reynolds, and presented petitions from members of the community in support of the resolution. The group was advised that if approval were given to the resolution, present policy of the Board would have to be changed, and in the absence of such a proposal from any member of the Board, the request was denied. The group pressed for positive action, and it was stated by several members of the Board that they felt the present policy for the county as a whole should remain. Schools named for individuals long ago have lost their identity, as the significance of the name has been lost by the passage of time, and the consensus of the Board was that the naming of schools for geographic locations should be continued.

Col. Bud Devens of the Blacksburg High School Athletic Association and several of its members were present to report on the progress of the work on the athletic field. The grading contract of C. R. Sult has been completed, with an additional \$912.69 over the original contract price of \$3300.00 being paid by the Association. The additional work was necessitated by the discovery of rock, and authorized by the Superintendent with no change in the contract with the School Board. The Blacksburg Kiwanis Club wishes to donate the press box after plans have been approved by the School Board. The Association asked the School Board to accept their assurance of payment of their portion of the cost of the work being done so that they would not have to borrow at this time to make immediate payment. Mr. Christopher moved that the superintendent check with the School Board Attorney to determine if it is legal for the School Board to accept a promissory note, or letter of intent to pay, in lieu of cash, and that the Association furnish their portion of the funds as a basis for placing the order. Motion was seconded by Mr. Sutphin and passed.

Mr. Dunkenberger moved that the School Board secure quotations on the bleacher seating (maintenance-free type) from Virginia manufacturers immediately for both Christiansburg and Blacksburg athletic fields. Mr. Walters seconded the motion and it was passed. Mr. Stevens was requested to telephone the principals or coaches of schools where Hussey's product had been purchased, and find out if they had considered other types, and why they considered Hussey superior.

Mr. Shane, Architect, was present to discuss the single bid presented on this date for the construction of the vocational wing of the new Christiansburg High School. He recommended acceptance of this bid of J. E. Davis and Sons, Inc., at \$1,151,151.00, since it is within the original estimate. Dr. Graybeal moved that the bid be accepted, seconded by Mr. Christopher and passed unanimously. The contract will be awarded subject to the approval of the State Department of Education, since federal funds have been applied for.

Contracts for construction of the new elementary schools in Blacksburg and Christiansburg were presented, and they will be studied by the School Board Attorney and superintendent before being signed.

Mr. Dunkenberger moved for the adoption of the following resolution, seconded by Dr. Graybeal and unanimously approved:

WHEREAS the Reverend H. E. Poff has served on the Montgomery County School Board since July, 1966, and

WHEREAS he submitted his resignation to be effective April 1, 1972, and

WHEREAS his health was the prime factor compelling him to submit his resignation,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the School Board express its deep regrets that the Reverend Poff's state of health has caused him to resign from the Board, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Board express to the Reverend Poff the debt of gratitude due him by the School Board, the central office staff, the teachers, the children, the parents, and all who have benefited by his many fine offices, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Board express its thanks for the Reverend Poff's many fine contributions toward the solution of the many problems arising from the operation of the county schools and the launching of a comprehensive building program, and

Finally, BE IT RESOLVED that the Board inform the Reverend Poff that his wise counsel will be missed and that best wishes are extended for his good health and happiness.

Letter of appreciation was read from the Blacksburg High School Concert Choir for the piano which had been purchased specifically for this group with the aid of School Board funds.

Mr. King reported that the \$60,000. which was borrowed would have to be repaid on the 26th of May. It is proposed that \$100,000.00 be borrowed to repay the loan which is due, and the \$40,000.00 will be needed to pay upcoming bills. It was the concensus of the Board that this was the proper procedure.

Mr. Hale reported that there would be a sale of municipal bonds in June and he had met with the Board of Supervisors to request the sale of \$2,000,000. for Montgomery County. Mr. Sowder, School Board Attorney, will have a resolution prepared for action of the Board on May 16, to be presented to the Board of Supervisors.

The following trip requests were approved on motion by Dr. Graybeal, seconded by Mr. Sale and passed:

Mr. Dunkenberger moved that the Superintendent be authorized to act as the agent of the School Board, as its representative, to make application for federal funds under Title I or any other applicable legislation, with the exception of Public Law 874, for which the Assistant Superintendent has already been authorized to apply. Motion was seconded by Mr. Mathena and passed unanimously.

Proposal of Simmons and Winbery for auditing the schools of the county with cafeterias was presented, which showed a \$450.00 increase over last year. Mr. Sale moved that the Superintendent be authorized to discuss the matter with the company since they indicated another school would be added which does not yet have a cafeteria in operation, and arrange for them to do the work at a cost not to exceed \$2550.00, seconded by Dr. Graybeal and passed.

Mr. Hale presented each Board member with information which indicates that funds from Public Law 874 might be critically reduced if the present recommendation of the House Committee is approved. The Board members were urged to write letters to members of the committee, their congressmen and senators to urge that no reduction be made, since the loss of these funds would be critical in Montgomery County. Dr. Stewart will call J. Kenneth Robinson or the Hon. Daniel J. Flood, of the House of Representatives, to find out the reasoning behind the recommended cut, and obtain information as to how the Board can express their concern in the most effective manner.

AASA associate membership cards were presented to each School Board member.

Gasoline, coal, fuel oil and typewriter bids were opened and studied by Mr. Stevens, Mr. Quesenberry, and the county business teachers. On motions duly made and seconded, the following low bidders were awarded the contracts for the coming year:

The Montgomery County School Board met in special session on the above date at 8:00 p.m. with all members present. Due to the late arrival of Dr. J. R. Stewart, Chairman, from out of town, Mr. T. M. Dunkenberger, Vice Chairman, presided.

The following school trips were unanimously approved:
Price's Fork 5th grade to TV Station and Airport, Roanoke
Gilbert Linkous 3rd grade to Cascades.

Mr. Hale reported that signing of the contract for the vocational section of new Christiansburg High School has been delayed, due to the fact that release has not been received from the State Department of Education regarding the amount of funds available.

Mr. Stevens gave a report on bleadhers which had been studied for purchase at Christiansburg High School, comparing prices and types. He had been unable to reach the principal of Western Branch High School, Chesapeake, Virginia, regarding their bleachers, so he talked with the purchasing agent in the School Board Office there and found that the Hussey bleacher was purchased because it was recommended by their architect and the school personnel which studied the matter. They felt these bleachers would require less maintenance and last longer than less expensive types.

Mr. Hale reported that Mr. Allen Sowder, School Board Attorney, did not look with favor on the legality of receiving a promissory note from the Blacksburg Athletic Foundation, as this group is made up of interested individuals and is not incorporated. If for any reason the Foundation was unable to make payment as promised, the School Board would be obligated for the entire outlay of funds, as the equipment is to be installed on School Board property. It does not appear that the School Board would have any legal recourse if the Foundation were unable to make payment. The Foundation will be notified of this legal opinion.

This meeting was called primarily for a discussion of the request of the County Board of Supervisors to cut \$400,000.00 from the 1972-73 School Board Budget. Mr. Hale reviewed his and Mr. King's conference with the Board of Supervisors at the time the budget was presented, and expressed the feeling that he and Mr. King were encouraged after the presentation because they thought the budget was looked upon favorably. Therefore, he was somewhat surprised to receive the call from the Executive Secretary's office requesting the reduction. He presented facts and figures in support of the budget as it stands, and stated that reports that taxes would have to be doubled because of the School Board budget were in error when the actual amount to be expended from local funds was taken into account.

Mr. Mathena moved that Mr. Hale contact the Chairman of the Board of Supervisors and schedule a meeting with them to re-submit the budget for further consideration, with the statement that the only place it could be reduced adequately to comply with their directive would be in salaries. Motion was seconded by Mr. Christopher and passed unanimously.

Sample letters to be written to the conferee on the committee studying Public Law 874 were given to each member to be used in protesting the cancelling of federal funds under this law.

Mr. Hale gave each member a summary of high school annual reports over the past five years.

A proposed school calendar was presented to each member for study to be voted upon at the May 16 meeting of the Board.

Mr. King stated that Mr. E. D. Pierce, Broker of Record for Insurance for the School Board, has proposed having the various types of insurance coverage put into a package plan, which he believes will result in a saving. United States Fidelity and Guaranty Company had agreed to furnish this, and it was the feeling of some of the School Board members that other companies should be invited to bid on the same package. Types of insurance to be included are: transportation, fire (including extended coverage, vandalism, malicious mischief and builders' risk), burglary, bonds, inland marine (items such as band instruments and uniforms, and other equipment which is moved from place to place within the system), and Workmen's Compensation. Insurance not included would be scholastic accident and disability income. All fire insurance for the county schools will expire on June 1.

Dr. Graybeal moved that the seven agencies now carrying the insurance be notified of this proposal, and have them get quotations from the companies they represent, with authorization to Mr. Hale to accept the lowest quotation if it meets requirements. Commission would be divided among the agencies of the company submitting the successful bid. Motion was seconded by Mr. Sutphin and passed.

Mr. Mathena asked if the School Board could pay for the water meter to be installed at Price's Fork School by the Price's Fork Water Authority. He was advised that it is standard procedure for the School Board to pay for meters installed at the schools.

Mr. Sale moved that the Board go into executive session for the discussion of personnel problems and land purchase, seconded by Mr. Mathena and passed.

On returning to open session, it was moved by Mr. Christopher, seconded by Dr. Graybeal and passed, that Aubrey Broyles, III, be excused from compulsory attendance upon the request of the parent, principal, superintendent of schools and the Judge of the Juvenile Court.

Belview Elementary School on Route 114; Bethel Elementary School on Route No. 117; and, Elliston-Lafayette Elementary School north of Elliston on U. S. Routes 11 and 460, and a library and classrooms for this school. An addition of a gymnasium, an auditorium, classrooms, and other spaces, and the renovation of certain of the facilities, at Shawsville High School and Auburn High School.

MINUTES

MONTGOMERY COUNTY SCHOOL BOARD

June 6, 1972

The Montgomery County School Board met in regular session on the above date at 8:00 p.m. with all members present. Supt. Hale, E. L. King, G. C. Guilliams, J. E. Earp and B. E. Stevens were present.

Dr. Stewart, Chairman, called the meeting to order and asked Mr. Guilliams to lead in prayer. Mr. Guilliams called for a few moments of meditation in honor of Rev. H. E. Poff, former member of the School Board, who died on June 5, and then led in prayer.

Mr. Sale moved that minutes for the meeting of May 16 be approved without reading, seconded by Mr. Sutphin and passed. Each member was furnished with a copy of these minutes.

Mr. Hale read a letter from the State Highway Department in which they indicated that the land adjacent to the new Shawsville Elementary School belonging to them was not for sale at the present time. The School Board had indicated an interest in purchasing this plot containing approximately two acres.

Letter from Mr. and Mrs. James Boyd was read, in which they requested permission for their child to enroll in first grade at Riner Elementary School instead of Bethel Elementary School. Their objection with Bethel was the lack of sufficient water supply. This is being remedied by the installation of a water system from the Public Service Authority. Mr. Dunkenberger moved that the parents be notified that the Board's policy of having children attend the school in their designated attendance area would have to be observed, therefore the request is denied, seconded by Dr. Graybeal and passed.

Letter of appreciation from Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University to the School Board for permitting schools to be dismissed early for students to attend the centennial celebration in Blacksburg May 23 was read to the Board.

Letter was read from Mrs. Dorothy S. King, Principal, Shawsville Elementary School, expressing appreciation to the Board for their success in having the cut in the current budget restored and for their continued interest in quality education in the county.

Mr. King gave a report on the progress being made in securing quotations on insurance under a package plan. He requested that a decision be reached regarding the amount of coverage under liability insurance and that a date be set for receiving the bids. Mr. Christopher moved that the Board take liability insurance of \$100,000./\$300,000. with as broad coverage as possible, including food protection. Motion was seconded by Mr. Sutphin and passed.

Dr. Graybeal moved that the bid opening be set for June 20, seconded by Mr. Sale and passed.

Mr. Hale presented quotation of Burroughs Corporation on a Model L5000 computer for bookkeeping and payroll operation in the office, at \$25,011.75. The present system being used is so outdated and so time-consuming that he recommended the purchase of this machine. Some discussion was held regarding leasing of the machine for a year, but it was felt that this would be far more expensive and the discount would not apply. Mr. Sutphin moved, on basis of having the funds available, and on recommendation of the Superintendent and Chairman of the Board, that the machine be purchased, seconded by Dr. Graybeal and passed.

Mr. Hale requested that a representative of the School Board be appointed to a two year term on the Blue Ridge ETV Association Board of Directors. Dr. Jeffrey R. Stewart was elected by acclamation.

Mr. Hale reported that the lights, bleachers and various athletic and physical education equipment should be purchased immediately in order for it to be installed by the opening of school. Mr. Sutphin moved that the Board request Mr. Hale to contact Smithey and Boynton, Architects, and work with them on the lighting at Shawsville and obtain bids on the recommended location so that it could be acted on no later than the first regular meeting in July. Motion was seconded by Mr. Dunkenberger and passed.

Dr. Graybeal moved that the Board authorize Mr. Hale to advise the citizens' athletic associations in Blacksburg and Christiansburg that monies will be available to the amounts set in the budget for the bleacher installation, and that he consolidate negotiations with contractors to get projects under way. Motion was seconded by Mr. Mathena and passed. All purchases will be made by the School Board, and all contracts will be signed by the School Board.

On the recommendation of Smithey and Boynton, the Board agreed that bidding of the Auburn and Shawsville High School additions be done separately and at different times; and also that the bidding of Price's Fork, Belview and Bethel be done separately and as a package.

The Superintendent was authorized, on motion by Dr. Graybeal, seconded by Mr. Mathena and passed, to submit application to the Division of Justice and Crime Prevention for funds in the amount of \$8,829.00 to continue the operation of Project Lookout.

The School Board members have been asked to serve as honorary pallbearers for Rev. Poff on June 7 at 2:00 p.m.

The date for the July organizational meeting was set for July 11.

Brownie Girl Scout Troop 724 has requested permission to meet weekly in the multipurpose room of Elliston-Lafayette School, after school hours. Mr. Christopher moved that the request be granted, with approval and regulations to be given by the principal of the school, seconded by Mr. Sale and passed.

Dr. Stewart requested that the completion of the Policies bulletin be expedited, and was assured by the Superintendent that he was making every attempt to get this accomplished, with very little result.

Mathena, R. L. Sutphin and Glenn Walters. R. E. Christopher and Albin Sale were absent. Supt. Hale, E. L. King and B. E. Stevens were present.

Minutes for the meeting of June 6 were approved without reading, on motion by Mr. Sutphin, seconded by Mr. Mathena and passed.

Letter from Trinity Baptist Church, Christiansburg, was read, in which they requested use of some rooms in the Christiansburg Elementary School which is just across the street from the church, on Sunday mornings for Sunday school. The Board approved the request subject to legal details and other necessary information to be worked out by the Superint endent.

Mr. Glenn Cochran of the Board of Supervisors was present to report that this Board had cut \$100,000. from the School Board budget for land purchase. If the School Board finds land that they need to purchase the Board of Supervisors will cooperate in any way possible to make the funds available. He also reported that the Supervisors are still trying to get legal clearance for appointment of a School Board member to replace Rev. H. E. Poff.

Mr. King reported on the information sent to the insurance agencies bidding on the package insurance and opened the bids. The advisory committee on insurance for Roanoke City School Board will meet with Mr. Hale on June 21 to review the bids and give their recommendations. It was voted to return a bid from the Montgomery County Farm Bureau unopened, since they had not been participating in the conferences of the other agencies regarding the bidding.

Mr. Dunkenberger moved that the traveling expenses of the Roanoke advisory committee be paid by the School Board, seconded by Dr. Graybeal and passed.

Mr. Hale reported that order has been placed for bleachers at the athletic fields being improved. Mr. Hale read a letter from Dr. A. P. Johnston of VPISU, in which he expressed appreciation for the use of the new Shawsville Elementary School for demonstrating the open plan for an Open Space Institute which was held recently.

Mr. King reported on the progress of the package insurance plan, stating that the advisory committee from Roanoke had recommended that the School Board appoint a similar advisory committee for Montgomery County, to be elected by the insurance agencies. The enrollment at Ironto School for the 1972-73 session will be only 27 pupils. She also questioned an item under Adult Education and was informed that this was to cover a learning center which would be reimbursed 90% from federal funds.

Mr. Arnold Scott requested an explanation of how increases were determined, and whether back-up information was on file to support the increases. He was assured that a careful study was made of prior expenditures in order to secure the estimates included in the budget. The point was stressed that the budget is merely an estimate, not a fixed amount that has to be spent.

Mr. Hale gave a progress report on the building program which he feels is advancing on schedule. Riner and Shawsville Elementary Schools are complete except for some minor mechanical items, and the paving at Riner. Blacksburg High School construction has reached the half-way mark and it is hoped that it can be open for use by the fall of 1973. Weather has interfered with the work at Christiansburg High School, but good progress is being made and opening is expected by the fall of 1974. Blacksburg Elementary School grading has been completed at the actual site of the building, and footings will be poured soon. At Christiansburg Elementary site more rock has been encountered than expected. It is hoped that the two last-named can be opened in September 1973. Additions to Beeks, Linkous and Elliston-Lafayette plans are in the final drawing stages. Bidding has been advertised for grading of the Auburn addition, and final drawings for the building are in Richmond for approval.

The Shawsville addition plans are almost ready to be sent to Richmond. Price's Fork, Belview and Bethel kindergarten additions have tentative approval.

The following resolution was unanimously approved on motion by Mr. Mathena, seconded by Dr. Graybeal:

"WHEREAS, it is required under School Building Regulation 5.22 that adequate supervision of the building construction by a qualified person shall be provided by the owners; and that assurance of this supervision shall be furnished by the local school board to the State Supervisor of School Buildings prior to approval of the plans and specifications for such construction, now therefore

BE IT RESOLVED THAT the School Board of Montgomery County hereby gives assurance that it will provide adequate supervision by a qualified person during the construction of School Plant Projects No. 60-16B, Addition to Bethel Elementary School; 60-70C, Addition to Belview Elementary School; and 60-21B, Addition to Price's Fork Elementary School.

Mr. King reported that proceeds have not been received from the sale of bonds on July 19, therefore loans cannot be repaid to the two banks which hold them as follows:

First Virginia Bank of the Southwest \$40,000.00 @ 2.10%
First National Exchange Bank \$60,000.00 @ 2.29%
He recommended that the banks be requested to carry the notes on a day to day basis at the same rate of interest until the receipt of funds from the bond sale. Dr. Graybeal moved acceptance of the recommendation, seconded by Mr. Roberts and passed.

Mr. Robert Mills, Architect, was present to request that the new elementary schools in Blacksburg and Christiansburg be officially named as soon as possible so that proper names can be imprinted on plaques. Since the three new members had not had time to consider the matter, it was agreed to table the matter until the next meeting of the School Board.

Mr. Stevens presented a revised salary scale to be used as a guideline for determining children eligible for free or reduced price lunches. A scale beginning with zero to \$2450. income was approved on motion by Mr. Christopher, seconded by Dr. Graybeal.

Mr. Roberts moved that the motion be amended so that schools would have to make a specific request of the School Board before being allowed to serve breakfasts, seconded by Dr. Graybeal and passed.

The original motion as amended was passed.

Mr. Stevens reported that he had had an offer from Southwestern Truck Equipment Company to purchase two used 66-passenger buses. This company furnished the padding for the bus seat backs, and Mr. Stevens recommended that they be allowed to purchase the two buses, for which he had a verbal offer of \$600.00 each, after the new buses are received. Dr. Graybeal moved that Mr. Stevens be allowed to negotiate with this company and any others that might be interested at a minimum of \$600.00 per bus when the new buses have arrived, seconded by Mr. Mathena and passed.

Bids for pest control and paint were opened in the presence of the Board. Mr. Stevens will study the quotations and report his recommendation at the next meeting.

Mr. Earp presented quotations of three scholastic accident insurance companies for providing coverage for the session 1972-73. He recommended the plan of Walker Insurance Agency, which was employed last year, at a premium of \$2.75 per child. Dr. Jurisson requested that parents desiring to do so be allowed to pay for their children's insurance, thereby reducing the total amount to be paid by the School Board. He was assured that any parent desiring to do so would be permitted to pay the \$2.75 per child.

The following bills and disbursements were approved for payment on motion by Mr. Christopher, seconded by Mr. Walters and passed:

Dr. Graybeal moved that the Board go into executive session for the discussion of pupil and property problems, seconded by Mr. Mathena and passed.

Mr. Hale presented the request of Judge G. Garland Wilson for the release of two pupils from compulsory school attendance for the 1972-73 session. They are Frank Samuel Jones and Lloyd Evans Linkous, both of Blacksburg High School. Upon return to open session, Mr. Christopher moved that both boys be released, seconded by Mr. Roberts and passed.

Mr. Hale reported that the trailers parked over the property line on the Christiansburg Elementary School site had not been moved. It was the consensus of the Board that the Commonwealth's Attorney should be notified of this trespass on public property and requested to proceed with whatever action is necessary to have it corrected.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned.

The Montgomery County School Board met on the above date at 8:00 p.m. with the following members present: T. M. Dunkenberger, Vice Chairman; H. C. Graybeal, J. E. Breland, G. D. Walters, R. E. Christopher, Mrs. Janet R. Shelburne, Raymond Roberts. Mr. Dunkenberger presided in the absence of the Chairman, Dr. J. R. Stewart.

Minutes for the regular meeting of August 8 were approved without reading, since each member had been mailed a copy.

Members of the Montgomery County Board of Supervisors were present to discuss the use of the Burroughs mini-computer purchased by the School Board by other county agencies. Mr. Carey of the Burroughs Company was present. Mr. B. B. Hylton, Chairman, Board of Supervisors, stated that a State Auditor had indicated he felt this machine was large enough to handle all of the county accounting. Mr. Carey was asked his opinion, and replied that it would be necessary for a survey of the needs of the county to be made before he could give a reply. Mr. Mathena moved that Mr. Carey be requested to make this survey, determining the amount of time needed by the School Board for its operations, and the amount of time required by the other county agencies for their operations. If it is felt that the machine can handle the total load, or even a portion of it, further discussion will be held as to further details. Motion was seconded by Mr. Christopher and passed.

Bids were opened on August 14 for the grading of the Auburn High School for the new addition. Smithey and Boynton, Architects, recommended acceptance of the low bid of Albert Brothers Contractors, Inc., at \$95,182. Mr. Christopher moved that the recommendation be accepted, seconded by Dr. Graybeal and passed.

Mr. Hale reported that the money from the most recent bond sale of \$2,000,000. will be received on August 25 and representatives of the Board of Supervisors will go to Richmond to receive it. It was decided that current loans would be repaid from this amount and the balance would be invested for use as the needs arise.

Mr. Stevens reported from his study of the proposals for pest control from two companies - Orkin and Dodson, who bid \$45.50 and \$78.50 respectively for pest control in the kitchens, food storage areas and home economics departments. Dr. Graybeal moved that the low bid of Orkin be accepted, seconded by Mr. Mathena and passed.

Mr. Stevens has also reviewed the proposals for furnishing paint, and stated that Blacksburg Feed and Seed and Mitchell Sales Co. had submitted identical quotations of \$4.79 per gallon for Glidden paint. He recommended requesting those two companies to re-submit their bids. Mr. Christopher moved that the recommendation be accepted, seconded by Mr. Roberts. Dr. Graybeal moved to amend the motion so that Mr. Stevens could be permitted to accept the low bid without bringing the matter back to the Board. Amendment was passed, and original motion as amended was passed.

A list of teachers and supervisory staff was presented to each Board member, with the Superintendent's recommendation for their appointment. Dr. Graybeal moved that the list be approved, seconded by Mr. Walters and passed.

Request of Blacksburg High School GAA to attend Klassroom Kwiz on Monday, August 28, was presented. Approval was granted for them to provide their own transportation for the first trip, and if they win to provide bus transportation for future trips.

Mr. Hale reported that membership in the Virginia Education Association for School Board members is \$25.00 per person. Anyone who wishes to join may give their check to Mr. Hale.

Mr. Hale read a Superintendents Memo from the State Department of Education which indicated that travel for vocational teachers could be approved at $10 \, \varphi$ per mile instead of the former $9 \, \varphi$. Since the budget had been figured at $9 \, \varphi$ per mile, no action was taken to change this amount.

Copies of a letter from the Virginia School Boards Association regarding changing of the by-laws, which will be taken up at the annual meeting, were given to each member.

Dr. D. B. Jurisson had requested time on the agenda and he was recognized. He requested that parents be notified that they could pay for their children's scholastic accident insurance, art and other instructional supplies. It was the consensus of the Board that this would be an improper procedure, since the amount to cover these items had already been approved for the 1972-73 budget. Any changes would have to be considered at the time the next budget is prepared.

The following bills were approved for payment on motion by Mr. Christopher, seconded by Mr. Roberts and passed:

Operating Fund - \$3,228.00, check nos. 11947 through 11993 1969 School Building Fund - \$10,345.73, check nos. 381, 382 1970 School Building Fund - \$153,244.04, check nos. 32 through 40

Mr. Walters moved that the Board go into executive session for discussion of pupil problems, seconded by Mr. Roberts and passed.

McKinley Logan and his father were present to request that he be readmitted to Christiansburg High School. He was expelled in October 1971. He was questioned about his willingness to be regular in attendance and conduct himself properly, and he agreed that he wanted to return on this basis.

Mr. Hale presented request of Judge G. Garland Wilson for release of FraZier Lee Dove, Christiansburg High School student, from compulsory school attendance.

Mr. Hale reported that Mr. Robert McMichael had expressed willingness to pay the \$681.00 tuition required for his 20-year old son, Michael, to attend Blacksburg High School and live with his older brother.

Mr. Hale reported that the mother of Mary Ellen Miller had appointed this girl's sister, Mrs. Beverly Patton, as her guardian so that the girl could live with the sister and attend Blacksburg High School. No action required.

Request of Mrs. Joe Stewart, Jr., who lives in the Elliston-Lafayette School

attendance area for her son, Brian to attend kindergarten at the Shawsville School was presented. The child's father is a terminal cancer case, and the mother requested that the child be allowed to attend kindergarten rather than having to be placed with various baby-sitters during this crisis.

Upon return to open session, Col. Breland moved that McKinley Logan be permitted to reenter Christiansburg High School and to remain as long as he conducts himself properly, attending regularly, seconded by Mr. Roberts and passed.

Request of Judge Wilson for release of Frazier Dove from compulsory school attendance was approved on motion by Mr. Walters, seconded by Mr. Roberts and passed.

Col. Breland moved that Walter McMichael be permitted to attend Blacksburg High School as long as no problems of conduct arise, seconded by Mr. Roberts and passed, with tuition to be paid in advance on a semester basis.

Mr. Walters moved that Brian Stewart be permitted to attend the Shawsville kindergarten although he does not live in the attendance area, because of the hardship situation. Motion was seconded by Mr. Mathemand passed.

Col. Breland asked for clarification of the School Board's position on re-zoning of the property adjacent to the Margaret Beeks School to permit the erection of multi-family units, since he felt the letter addressed to the Blacksburg Planning Commission stating that "the School Board could find no reason at this time to object to such a development of the property" was not clear. He was informed that this was actually the consensus of the Board--they had no reason to object and they had no reason to approve, therefore their position is neutral since it is believed that taking a position in matters of zoning is not a function of the School Board.

Meeting adjourned.

The Montgomery County School Board met in regular session on the above date at 8:00 p.m. with the following members present: J. R. Stewart, Chairman; J. E. Breland, H. C. Graybeal, R. E. Mathena, Mrs. Janet R. Shelburne, Raymond Roberts, G. D. Walters, R. E. Christopher. T. M. Dunkenberger was absent. Supt. Hale, G. C. Guilliams and E. L. King were present.

The meeting was opened with prayer by Mr. Guilliams.

Col. Breland moved that the minutes of August 22 be approved with an amendment to include the discussion regarding the rezoning of the property adjacent to the Margaret Beeks School. Motion was seconded by Mrs. Shelburne and passed.

Dr. D. B. Jurisson requested that the School Board budget be voluntarily reduced in the item for Repair and Replacement of Equipment from \$148,000. to \$88,000. He also recommended that the Health Department be requested to do the physical examinations for teachers at no cost to the School Board.

Col. Breland moved that the matter of the Repair and Replacement item in the budget be tabled until the next meeting, and that a full explanation of its distribution be made at the next meeting, seconded by Mrs. Shelburne and passed.

Mr. Hale presented each member with a tabulation of the manner in which the \$2,000,000 from the sale of bonds had been invested with various banks, to come due as needed for payment on construction of buildings in the 1970 School Building Program.

Mrs. Judith McNeil stated that she had had several individuals to view the site of the grading at Auburn High School who felt that this could be done for a much smaller figure than the \$95,182. contract which was awarded at the last meeting of the School Board. She requested that the contract be read aloud, but the Superintendent reported that he did not have a copy since it had been forwarded to the contractor for his signature.

Mrs. McNeil also complained about the fact that the lunchroom at the new Riner Elementary School was not yet in operation, and her child had to walk to the high school to each lunch. It was explained that the sewer system was to be joined to the Public Service Authority system, since the Health Department had ruled that the soil at this site was not suitable for installation of a septic tank system.

At this point, the Chairman read the policy of the School Board with regard to individuals or delegations wishing to address the Board. This policy states that request must be made for an appearance before the Board and a time limit observed. Later in the meeting Mr. Mathena moved that a specific amount of time be provided at the beginning of the meetings for citizens to be heard so that the business of the Board would not be interrupted once the session had begun. He recommended a 30-minute time limit for public addresses not scheduled by request in writing. Col. Breland seconded the motion and it was passed.

Mr. Hale reported that the grading is almost completed at the new Christiansburg High School site and seeding should be done before the winter season starts. Col. Breland asked if a civic group would be interested in taking this for a project, and he was advised that it was a larger operation than such groups would usually be interested in since it involves soil preparation of approximately 20 acres. Col. Breland moved that Mr. Hale be authorized to have the architects prepare specifications and advertise for bids for this seeding, seconded by Mr. Mathena and passed.

Mr. Hale announced the Virginia School Boards Association meeting in Roanoke October 5, 6 and 7 and stated that an official delegate should be named. Dr. Stewart was unanimously appointed delegate, with Mr. Dunkenberger to serve as alternate.

The Insurance Company of North America had made a technical survey of the schools and strongly recommended installation of battery-powered emergency lighting at Blacksburg High School, Auburn High School, Shawsville High School, Christiansburg Primary, Linkous and Beeks, to avoid panic in case of power failure when large crowds are present. Mr. Christopher moved that the Superintendent be authorized to take appropriate action to comply with the regulations, using a portable type of bettery-powered lighting, seconded by Mr. Walters and passed.

Mr. Hale presented a tabulation comparing enrollment on the third day of school for the 1971-72 session with the present session. This shows an increase of 124 over last year.

Mrs. Shelburne presented each member with a suggested policy for handling teacher applications. The Chairman suggested that the members study the policy and be prepared to discuss it further at a later meeting.

Mr. Roberts asked what rental fee was being paid to the churches where classrooms are being used. Mr. Hale stated that it was approximately \$157. per month per classroom, which includes utilities and janitor services.

Mr. Roberts also asked what locker rent covered in the high schools, and Mr. Hale replied that this was forthe lock, to cover cost of repair and replacement. Mr. Roberts stated that his child had brought home a letter from the physical education teacher at Blacksburg High School which stated that if proper athletic uniform was not purchased the grades would be cut, and he felt that the Board had decreed that the stipulation was to be that the students be appropriately attired, with the actual uniform not being mandatory. Mr. Hale said that students were encouraged to dress in the appropriate uniform and that he would investigate the matter.

Col. Breland referred to items in the budget for Supervisors, Instructional Supplies, Repair and Replacement of Equipment, requesting clarification. He also inquired about the scholastic accident insurance and was informed that this was furnished for every pupil by the School Board and covered the children on their way to and from schools and at all functions sponsored by the school. It is furnished by the Walker Agency of Charlotte, N. C.

Mr. Christopher asked if insurance coverage of buildings was based on actual cash value or replacement value. Mr. Hale said that the insurance committee was studying this matter and he felt sure that it was at replacement value.

Mr. Christopher moved that the staff be instructed to study the feasibility of serving lunches in the Riner Elementary School until the sewerage system can be completed, seconded by Mrs. Shelburne and passed.

Col. Breland requested that a copy of the agenda be sent to each Board member prior to the meetings so that they could be better prepared to discuss the items listed. He was informed that matters sometimes are not presented for discussion until the day of the meeting; however, it was agreed that whatever items are known will be sent to the members before the meetings.

Mr. Arnold Scott requested that each School Board member carefully study each item in the current budget and satisfy himself that the budget is correct.

The following bills and disbursements were approved for payment on motion by Mr. Walters, seconded by Mr. Roberts and passed unanimously:

Mr. Christopher moved that the School Board go into executive session for discussion of pupil problems, seconded by Mr. Mathena and passed.

Board returned to open session. Moved by Col. Breland that Donald Burks and Sherwood Farrow be permitted to reenter Christiansburg High School, but they are to be removed if any violations of rules take place. Seconded by Dr. Graybeal and passed.

The Montgomery County School Board met in regular session on the above date at 8:00 p.m. with the following members present: J.R. Stewart, Chairman; T.M. Dunkenberger, J.E. Breland, R.E. Christopher, R.E. Mathena, Raymond Roberts, Mrs. Janet Shelburne, G.D. Walters. H.C. Graybeal was absent. Also present were Supt. Hale, E.L. King, B.E. Stevens, G.C. Guilliams, J.E. Earp, B.G. Cromer, R.C. Quesenberry.

Minutes for the regular meeting of September 5 were approved without reading since each member had received a copy.

The meeting was opened for 30 minutes for citizens to make presentations or ask questions. Mr. Arnold Scott presented each member with a budget review, and requested the members to study it with a view to making a voluntary reduction in various items. He indicated he felt there was a communication gap between the School Board, administration and teachers.

Mrs. Margaret Reed, Mrs. Judy McNeil, Mr. Quentin Boone, Mr. Paul Field, and Dr. D.B. Jurrison presented questions to which they requested answers. Since the time set aside for this purpose expired before answers could be given to the questions, it was decided by the Board members later in the meeting that answers would be mimeographed and distributed to interested persons at the next meeting.

Request of the Sheriff's Department for permission for students to participate in a study of police department procedure was tabled on motion by Col. Breland until further information could be obtained, and the superintendent and staff's recommendations could be secured, seconded by Mr. Shelburne and passed.

The state of the

Mr. Shane of the Architects was present to report that requests for bids had been mailed for seeding of the Christiansburg high school site to be received in the school board office on Thursday, September 28 at 2 p.m. This includes fine grading, fertilizing, seeding and mulching of the area not under construction and involves 25 to 30 acres. Mr. Roberts moved that this action be approved, seconded by Mr. Mathena, and passed.

Several alternate bids were received at the time the contract for this building was let, which covered paving and related work for the access road at \$70,000. and for the paving of the construction site and related work including water service to the building at \$110,000. Mr. Shane requested that he be authorized to issue change orders to permit installation of the water line to the building. Considerable amount of rock has been discovered where the sewer lines are to be installed and the contractor wants to do any necessary blasting before damage could be done to the building.

Mr. Christopher moved that the architect be authorized to issue a change order in the amount of \$59,300. for the former item, and \$17,191. for the latter, seconded by Mr. Roberts and passed.

J.H. Fralin and Son, contractors for construction of the new Blacksburg High School, have requested, since the building is 50% or more complete that progress payments be made in full, waiving any retainage. Mr.

Christopher moved, since the architects have certified the 50% completion, that this request be granted if it is in compliance with the original contract, seconded by Col. Breland and passed.

Mr. Hale presented the contract with Albert Brothers, Contractors, for the grading in connection with the addition to Auburn High School, for signature by the Chairman, which was approved.

Mr. King reported that the advisory insurance committee elected by the various insurance agencies in the county has recommended that the School Board notify the Virginia Insurance Rating Bureau that the new broker of record is the Shawsville Insurance Agency. Mr. Dunkenberger moved that a letter be written to the Bureau stating that Mr. James E. Pearman of the Shawsville Insurance Agency is to replace Mr. E.D. Pierce of Pierce Insurance Agency as the broker of record, and also to rescind the action of the Board at its June 25 meeting that the advisory committee be named as broker of record.

Mr. Hale reported that the grading at the Christiansburg Elementary School site is nearing completion and that seeding should be done as soon as possible. Col. Breland moved that the architect be requested to secure bids, seconded by Mr. Christopher and passed.

Mr. Hale asked if the Board members wished to make a tour of schools this fall as has been the custom for several years. He was requested to make arrangements, selecting two possible dates, so that the maximum number of members could participate.

The Superintendent reported that his study of the Riner Elementary School cafeteria situation had revealed that additional personnel and equipment would be needed to transport food to the children there, and the amount of additional sewerage involved could not be handled. He recommended continued use of the Auburn High School cafeteria until this facility can be placed in operation. Mr. Manuel Reynolds, Principal of the school, commented that his study had revealed that disposable items would be needed, also a vehicle and driver, if food were transported, which would require a large expenditure of funds. Mrs. Shelburne asked how soon the sewer hookup would be made at this school and she was informed that the FHA application had been completed this date and was ready to be submitted. It will take approximately six months to complete the construction. Mrs. Shelburne asked if the children could be allowed to eat their lunches in the multipurpose room if the parents preferred to pack their lunches rather than have them walk the short distance to the high school or be transported in bad weather. Mr. Reynolds replied that he would be glad to cooperate and this could easily be handled. Col. Breland moved that Mr. Reynolds be authorized to handle the problem of children whose parents do not wish them to be transported to the adjacent building for lunch, seconded by Mr. Dunkenberger and passed.

Mrs. Elizabeth Chapman, teacher at Auburn High School, has resigned her position, effective September 18, as her min ster husband has been unexpectedly transferred out of state. Mr. Hale recommended acceptance of her resignation, with Mr. Stephen W. Bull as her replacement. Mr. Christopher moved approval, seconded by Mr. Mathena and passed.

Mr. Hale reported that Dr. George W. Holmes had visited the county to up-date his school building survey, study of enrollment and projections through 1982. Mrs. Ritchie, supervisor of kindergartens of the State Department of Education visited the new kindergartens this date and complimented their effecient operation.

Dr. Stewart read a report prepared by the Superintendent's office, copy of which was given to each member, explaining the items in the budget entitled Maintenance of School Plant, and Repair and Replacement of Equipment.

Mrs. Shelburne expressed her hope that the ETV programming could be rearranged more adequately to meet the needs of the teachers. Evaluations have been completed by teachers each spring requesting changes, with no results. Since the School Board has a representative on the Executive Board of the Blue Ridge Educational Television Association it was felt that this expression could be made directly to the authorities there.

The following trips by school groups were approved on motions duly made and seconded:

Blacksburg High School Band to Radford College to attend a Band Clinic on October 25

Auhurn and Blacksburg High School FFA students to the State Fair in Richmond on September 26.

10 Forestry students from Blacksburg High School to the State Fair on September 22

Belview Fourth grade to Dixie Caverns October 12.

The Montgomery County Education Association has requested an evaluation by the National Education Association. They request permission for the evaluation committee to be given approval to visit with staff members during non-duty time, and for the President of the local Association to be released from his duties in order to assist in the evaluation. Mr. Christopher moved that approval be granted, seconded by Mr. Dunkenberger and passed.

Dr. Stewart asked how soon the Board members felt the naming of the new schools and re-naming of some of the present ones could be accomplished. It was decided that this would be placed on the agenda for the next meeting.

Dr. Stewart requested that as many members as possible attend whatever portion they could of the Virginia School Boards Association meeting to be held in Roanoke October 5-7.

Mr. Mathena expressed the feeling that the 30-minute time limit given for expressions by citizens at the beginning of the Board meeting would be adequate, and that it greatly expedited the actual business session.

Mrs. Shelburne referred to her policy proposal presented at the last meeting. The question was raised as to the legality of giving preference to Montgomery County teacher applicants, and she agreed to secure legal advice on this question. She asked for a copy of present policy on employment of teachers.

Mr. Dunkenberger raised the question of whether the School Board should request the County Planning Board to consider the increases in enrollment in certain areas precipitated by placement of large trailer parks in the county. The Board members agreed that this is certainly a problem, but did not know how much they could become involved in matters of this type.

The following bills and disbursements were approved for payment on motion by Mr. Dunkenberger, seconded by Mr. Roberts and passed:

The Montgomery County School Board met on the above date at 8 p.m. with the following members present: J. R. Stewart, Chairman; H. C. Graybeal, R. E. Mathena, Mrs. Janet Shelburne, Raymond Roberts, J. E. Breland, G. D. Walters, R. E. Christopher, T. M. Dunkenberger was absent. Supt. Hale, Messrs. Earp, Stevens, Cromer, Quesenberry and Guilliams were present. The meeting was opened with prayer by Mr. Guilliams.

Col. Breland moved that the minutes for the meeting of September 19 be approved without reading since each member had received a copy, seconded by Mr. Walters and passed. Col. Breland requested that the minutes be recorded more in detail.

Questions which had been asked at the preceding meeting, with the answers as provided by staff members of the School Board office, were distributed to all present and five minutes allowed for reading them.

Mrs. Marshall McNeil requested the Board to consider joining the access roads to the Auburn High School and the Riner Elementary School in order for the buses to unload all students at one time without having to go into the highway at each school. She also requested that the lunchroom be operated at the elementary school, with the sewage plant being pumped twice weekly to take care of this surplus, and disposable trays being used. If the Health Department does not approve this plan, then she requested that the food be prepared in the high school and transported to the elementary school.

Dr. D. B. Jurisson expressed the feeling that the \$20.00 fee allowed for physical examinations for teachers was too high, and that \$10.00 would be adequate. He asked that the School Board consider reducing the fee by next year, and allow the Health Department to make the tuberculin tests. He also requested that the number of supervisors be reduced. He asked if it would be permissible for a supervisor to teach a class or two to help earn their salary.

Mr. Hale read a letter from Simmons and Winbery, Certified Public Accountants, who announced that they were dissolving partnership as of September 30, 1972. They have been auditing the school accounts for a number of years.

A letter from the Virginia Insurance Rating Bureau was read acknowledging the Shawsville Insurance Agency as broker of record for the School Board.

Mr. Keister of Smithey and Boynton reviewed the plans for the kindergarten additions to Bethel, Belview and Price's Fork Schools. All of the plans are similar, with alterations to suit the sites without grading or filling. The Belview and Bethel additions will house about 50 children, and the Price's Fork addition 60 to 75. The Health Department has reviewed the plans, and the State Board of Education regulations have been complied with. Mr. Keister recommended that the Board advertise for bids for construction both individually and collectively, and suggested a month's bidding period. Mr. Mathena moved that bids be advertised on October 8, to be opened at the School Board Office at 2 p.m. on October 31, seconded by Col. Breland and passed.

Mr. Shane, Architect, reported that only one company has responded to the request for bids for seeding the Christiansburg High School grounds. This was Sisson and Ryan of Shawsville at \$16,000.00. He recommended that the School Board accept this bid so the seeding can be done before the first of November. The bid included fine grading, seeding, fertilizing, mulch and guarantee. The site covers approximately 28 acres. Concern was expressed that only one bid had been received but realized the urgency of having the seeding done before too late in the season. Col. Breland moved that the bid be rejected until more could be secured, as he felt this price was excessive, seconded by Mr. Christopher. The motion failed.

Mr. Mills, Architect, stated that he had a representative from the Agronomy Department of VPISU to view the site of the new elementary school, and he had stated that he estimated \$500. per acre for seeding of the site. He reported that he, too, had received only one bid - from Sisson and Ryan at \$7500.00 for the Christiansburg elementary school site.

Mr. Mathena moved, since there is a possibility of much of the already spread topsoil being lost during the winter unless a ground cover is provided, that the Board accept the bids for both projects, seconded by Dr. Graybeal and passed.

Mr. Shane stated that bidders for the laboratory equipment would have the equipment on display in the Resource Center of the School Board office, Wednesday, October 11 at 1:30 p.m., so that the architects will be in a better position to decide which types to recommend.

Mr. Mills requested that he be given authority to advertise for bids for the storm drainage at Blacksburg High School to be received on Thursday, October 17. Mr. Christopher moved that authority be granted, seconded by Mr. Roberts and passed.

A discussion was held regarding the naming of the new elementary school in Blacksburg, the present high school, and the new high school. Mr. Christopher moved that the elementary school be designated "Harding Avenue Elementary School", seconded by Mr. Mathena and passed.

Letters had been received suggesting the name "Indian Run" or some name in honor of the Kipps sisters who taught in Blacksburg for many years. It was felt that these requests could not be honored since they did not adhere to the Board's policy for naming schools for geographic locations. Col. Breland moved that the new high school be named "Blacksburg High School", seconded by Mr. Christopher and passed.

Mr. Christopher moved that the present Blacksburg High School located on South Main Street be changed to "Blacksburg Middle School" at the appropriate time after completion of the new high school. Motion was seconded by Mr. Roberts and passed.

The schools in Christiansburg will require re-naming when the enrollment is divided as follows: present high and elementary school to house grades 6, 7 and 8; new high school to house 9, 10, 11 and 12; the present primary school to house grades 3, 4 and 5; and the new school to house kindergarten through second grade. Dr. Graybeal moved that action be deferred on these names until the next meeting, seconded by Col. Breland and passed.

The following trip requests were approved on motion by Dr. Graybeal, seconded by Col. Breland and passed:

Request of the Blacksburg High School French Club that they be allowed to conduct a campaign for the Cancer Society in memory of Steve Kates, a member of the 1973 graduating class who died last year, for this year only, was approved on motion by Col. Breland, seconded by Mr. Walters and passed.

Letter was read from Mr. Douglas Morgan, Principal, Margaret Beeks School, in which he requested matching funds from the School Board for purchase of stage curtains. This would be \$600.00, as the PTA will furnish \$600.00. This was approved on motion by Mr. Walters, seconded by Dr. Graybeal and passed.

Mrs. Hindle, Special Education Supervisor, was present to request use of three report cards she had devised for use with the three special education classes. There is one trainable class at the Methodist Church in Christiansburg which houses 12 pupils from Shawsville and Blacksburg as well as Christiansburg. There are 4 EMR classes on the primary level, 1 at Shawsville, 1 at Blacksburg, 1 at Christiansburg and 1 at Riner. Two intermediate classes are held at Christiansburg and Riner. The Alpha program is for children between 12 and 16 years of age. This is conducted at Riner and Shawsville. In addition to academic subjects they are taught vocational industrial arts and home economics. There are 2 learning disabilities classes - one at Gilbert Linkous and one at Christiansburg Primary School. A teacher for hearing impaired is employed for testing the children and advising the teachers on meeting their needs in the individual classroom. Col. Breland moved that the cards be used on a trial basis, seconded by Mr. Mathena and passed.

Mrs. Beamer, Elementary Supervisor, requested that the Board approve continued use of the first grade report cards they approved last year on an experimental basis. She has a committee working on a revision of the card so that it can be made uniform for the entire county, and hopes to have this ready to submit in the very near future. Col. Breland moved approvel, seconded by Mr. Walters and passed.

Mrs. Shelburne reported that she had visited the Belview PTA meeting and they had listed school plant problems and needs regarding the heating system, water heater, lighting in several dassrooms, worn desks and tables, inadequate restroom facilities and additional classrooms. They requested use of a mobile unit for art and music, and enlargement of the multipurpose room. It was brought out in the architect's report of the kindergarten addition that some of these problems would be eliminated at that time, such as alteration of the heating system, including hot water, addition of electrical supply to permit installation of new lights. Mr. Mathena reported that these items had been brought to the Board last year and discussion, consideration and planning had been given to them. He stated that he and Mr. Hale reviewed the plans for improvement with the Belview PTA last May.

Mr. Roberts reported that he had attended two PTA meetings and found the members very interested and in support of the school system.

Col. Breland asked the status of the computer study. He was advised that the state auditor had not yet contacted the Burroughs representative in this regard. He also inquired about the policy pertaining to use of the school grounds in Blacksburg by VPISU students. He was informed that these facilities are primarily for the use of pupils attending the schools. The principal is in charge, and anyone on the grounds without permission can be evicted.

Col. Breland asked that no one be denied an application for a teaching position, and was informed that every request was now being answered with a formal application blank.

Mrs. Shelburne said that she was still in the process of finding out the legality of having Montgomery County residency or citizenship as a prerequisite of priority for employment of teachers. Dr. Graybeal commented that in his 16 years on the Board full consideration was given to employment of Montgomery County residents whenever a vacancy existed for which they were qualified.

Col. Breland inquired if any more property was to be adquired adjacent to the Harding Avenue School site, and if the acreage was sufficient to meet state requirements. He was informed that the State Department does not approve plans for a building until they are assured that maximum effort has been made to secure the required acreage and adequate acreage is in possession of the School Board to justify building on the site.

Col. Breland moved that the Board go into executive session for the discussion of pupil problems, seconded by Mr. Walters and passed.

The following were recommended for release from compulsory attendance

Ruby Jones - Christiansburg High School Samuel Epperly - Christiansburg High School Gary Ralph Kiser - Shawsville High School.

Reasons were given as truancy, inability to achieve, and disinterest.

Mr. Hale reported that the parent of the Thomas child who was injured in the school bus accident of February 1971 was suing the School Board and Basil Linkous, driver of the truck that hit the bus, for \$200,000. This will be handled by the insurance company.

After return to open session, Dr. Graybeal moved that Ruby Jones and Samuel Epperly be released from compulsory attendance on the recommendation of Judge Garland Wilson, and that Gary Ralph Kiser be released subject to Judge Wilson's approval since this case had not been presented to him. Motion was seconded by Mr. Walters and passed.

Mr. Guilliams presented a progress report on the Riner sewage system. He stated that it seems everything is in order for final approval of the loan from FHA except a \$2500.00 connection fee and a \$300.00 monthly service charge, which are needed to amorize the loan and pay the estimated operating costs. If the School Board will agree to underwrite these necessary costs then it will make it possible to start construction much sooner. He suggested that if this is done a check for \$2500.00 be written and held until the time that it is needed in case some other user agrees to hook on in the meantime. He abso said that if this was the procedure the School Board wishes to follow he would follow this up with the engineers to try to expedite construction. In addition, he reported that the Public Service Authority has agreed, as soon as . additional users are available for the system and additional income is received, that the School Board's monthly service charge would be lessened accordingly.

Moved by Mr. Roberts, seconded by Col. Breland that the project be approved as presented by Mr. Guilliams, with the School Board to underwrite the system at an additional \$2500.00 hook-up fee plus an additional \$300.00 monthly service charge, and that the School Board continue providing this revenue until additional users are obtained to provide the necessary revenue for amortizing the loan and operating the original system as proposed to be built initially as of this date. Motion was carried unanimously.

Breland, G. D. Walters, R. E. Christopher, T. M. Dunkenberger, R. E. Mathena was absent. Supt. Hale, Messrs. King, Earp, Stevens and Guilliams were present.

Each member had received a copy of the minutes for the meeting of October 3, 1972. Col. Breland stated that the minutes were very thorough and very good. Col. Breland moved that the minutes be amended to show those who opposed and those voting for the two motions pertaining to seeding the Christiansburg High School grounds and the new elementary school grounds, seconded by Mrs. Shelburne and passed. Col. Breland moved that the minutes of the October 3, 1972 meeting be approved as amended, seconded by Mrs. Shelburne and passed.

The meeting was opened for 30 minutes for citizens to make presentations or ask questions. Three citizens requested to be heard and 10 minutes were allotted to each by the Chairman.

Mrs. Marshall McNeil read a letter from J. F. Tolley, Regional Sanitarian, Department of Health, to Dr. Mary Tom Long, Director of Montgomery County Health Department, dated October 2, 1972, relative to the problem with Auburn Elementary and High School in that they are unable to use the cafeteria facilities because of the absence of a satisfactory sewage disposal system. The letter stated in part: "Should inclement weather occur before the connection is made to the public sewer system, then the school officials may wish to operate a satellite type of cafeteria service from the high school and resort to pumping and hauling of sewage on a very limited basis....this should be used only in emergency situations." She requested that food be prepared at the high school and taken to the elementary school.

Mrs. McNeil requested that she be furnished a list of the names of those who were sent advertisements regarding bidding on the seeding of the Christiansburg Elementary School grounds. She questioned the legality of accepting the one bid received from Sisson and Ryan, Shawsville--the legality to accept when only one bid is received, and also the legality of accepting a bid from a relative of a school board member (Mr. Dunkenberger is Mr. Ryan's son-in-law.) Mr. Dunkenberger stated that he did not own shares of stock in the corporation of Sisson and Ryan; did not receive a share of the profits and that he was only an employee receiving a salary. Long before he became a school board member, Sisson & Ryan had bid for work. in the county. He personally gave Mr. Shane a list of names (more than 10) of contractors who do seeding work in Virginia, West Virginia, Tennessee and Pennsylvania, to be sent requests to bid. Only five or six contractors picked up the plans but did not bid - he did not know why. Mr. Dunkenberger further stated that he does not know about the legality of the board passing on a bid when only one bid was received. Dr. Graybeal stated this had been done many times on coal and oil when only one bid was received.

Replying to Mrs. McNeil's question as to the legality of property being purchased by the School Board from a School Board member, Mr. Dunkenberger stated that if he owned a piece of property adjacent to the school and sold it to the School Board he did not feel there would be anything wrong in doing this?" Mr. Hale stated that all School Board purchases of land must be approved by the Court as well as land sold by the School Board.

Mrs. McNeil also questioned the legality of Dr. Graybeal's right to vote on fees paid to physicians for teachers' physical examinations..Dr. Graybeal stated that he did not feel that he should disqualify himself in this voting. If he had voted that he examine all the teachers there might be some question, but some of the people have been his patients for years. The fee set to be paid a physician has nothing to do with what the doctor actually charges. Mr. King stated that the cheapest fee charged by a doctor was \$3.00 and the highest fee paid was \$20.00. Although not all bills have been received for physical examinations the average fee paid would be around \$15.00. Replying to question by Col. Breland as to number of employees, Mr. King stated that there would be between 700 to 800, which would not include substitute bus drivers, substitute teachers and substitute cafeteria workers.

Arnold Scott expressed appreciation for the answers given out by the School Board two weeks ago. He submitted another list of questions to be answered at the next meeting, mainly regarding duties and travel of the supervisory staff. In reply to his question regarding the term of the Chairman and Vice Chairman of the School Board, Dr. Stewart stated that the Chairman and Vice Chairman are elected at the first meeting in July. A Chairman may succeed himself - there is no limitation. The policy of the Board has been to rotate the chairmanship.

Dr. D. B. Jurisson also distributed copies of questions he would like answered regarding the supervisory staff.

Bobby L. Simpson wanted to know when the kindergarten program started - 1973 or 1974. If it starts in some schools next year, can students from other areas of the county attend those schools? Mr. Hale said that he saw no reason why all kindergartens could not start in the schools by fall of 1974. As soon as facilities become available kindergarten will be started. He stated that if transportation could be worked out children from outside the attendance area of a school having kindergarten could attend, provided the schools were not already filled. Dr. Stewart said that the Board would consider individual requests for children entering kindengarten outside the attendance area if transportation could be worked out and the space was available.

Mr. Hale read a letter written by S. G. Kingma addressed to Mr. R. S. Wheeler, Principal, Gilbert Linkous Elementary School, requesting the use of the multi-purpose room of this school on Saturday, October 27, 1972 for an adult education program regarding Amway distributorship. Since this is a business firm and the general feeling was that schools should not be used for this type of program, Mr. Dunkenberger moved that the request, be denied, seconded by Mr. Roberts and unanimously passed.

Mr. Mills, Architect, reported on additions to Elliston-Lafayette, Beeks and Linkous Schools. There cannot be a natural flow of sewage at the Elliston-Lafayette site because the area is unsuitable for this - two pumps and a 3000 gallon septic tank will be used. The tanks cannot be moved from the back to the front without tearing up some of the road. Mr. Christopher requested that Mr. Mills furnish Mr. Hale a recommendation after he had had an opportunity to work it out. Col. Breland stated that tearing up the road should be avoided. Mr. Tom King, Health Department Official, explained the existing sewage drainage field which is located in front of the school. He recommended a new field be constructed because the present system was overtaxed and would have to be abandoned at some future date.

Mr. Mills stated there were no problems as to the Gilbert Linkous School addition. There is a problem with the sewer line for the Beeks addition which is being reviewed by the Town Engineers.

Mr. Mills stated that School Board members or anyone who might be interested should go to Prince William County, Virginia, to view schools with open classrooms and also to view school furniture there. Col. Breland moved that the principals of all four high schools be sent. There was no second to this motion. In further discussion, Mrs. Shelburne recommended that a teacher in a particular school attend. Mr. Mills and Mr. Hale advised the Board that the principals of the schools had been toally involved in planning the school buildings and had already visited schools in various locations. Dr. Stewart advised Mr. Mills that they would let him know later if anyone could make the trip.

Mr. Mills reported that all steel framing was complete at the Christiansburg and Blacksburg High School sites.

Mr. Mills reported on the bids received for the storm drainage at Blacksburg High School, which follow:

H. T. Bowling and E. R. Estes, Radford - \$62,461.00 base bid \$40.00 per cu. yd rock excavation

Hudgins and Pace, Roanoke - \$79,115.00 base bid; \$10.00 per cu. yd. rock excavation

Branch & Associates, Roanoke - \$86,900.00 base bid; \$30.00 per cu. yd. rock excavation.

Mr. Mills recommended that the low base bid received from H. T. Bowling and E. R. Estes be accepted, and that Mr. Hale and he be given authority to negotiate with them as to a lower bid for rock excavation. Mr. Dunkenberger moved that the Superintendent and Mr. Mills negotiate with this contracting firm in an attempt to reduce the amount of the bid for rock excavation, and report back to the School Board as soon as possible. Motion was seconded by Mr. Roberts and passed.

Dr. Graybeal moved that the following names be given to schools in Christiansburg: the new one under construction presently called "Christiansburg Area Elementary School" to be called "Christiansburg K School"; re-name the present Christiansburg High and Elementary complex "Christiansburg Middle School"; and retain the names "Christiansburg Primary School" for the present primary school, and "Christiansburg High School" for the new high school under construction. Motion was seconded by Mr. Dunkenberger and passed.

Mr. Stevens asked, on behalf of and acting as Chairman of, the Youth Highway Safety Committee, that one or two students from each school who plan to attend the Youth Conference to be held at Hotel Jefferson, Richmond, Virginia, be excused from school for that one day in order to attend the meeting. Col. Breland moved approval, seconded by Mr. Christopher and passed.

Mr. Stevens stated that members of Blacksburg Band Boosters Club had talked to one or more car dealers in the area with feference to some sort of lease arrangement for some type of vehicle to be used in moving band instruments. They are asking that the School Board furnish "Public Use" tags and provide insurance for a vehicle similar to the type of vehicle they previously had. The Band Boosters would pay the initial cost of this vehicle and someone designated by the Principal of the school would have control over who uses it. Dr. Stewart suggested that the Board wait until further information was furnished before taking any action on this.

Mrs. Shelburne asked if anything had been done with reference to an access road behind the Riner Elementary School. Mr. Hale stated that since the School Board had been able to acquire the Paskowski property, a revised plan would have to be submitted to the State Department for the access road. Dr. Stewart mentioned that some way should be provided to close off this road when not in use to avoid the road being used improperly.

Col. Breland asked about the request the Sheriff made regarding students studying the duties of his department. Mr. Earp stated that he had talked to Mr. Epperly, Deputy Sheriff, in charge of this, but still did not have enough data to present for discussion.

Col. Breland requested the Board be furnished a balance sheet on the building fund. Dr. Stewart stated this came out in the monthly Treasurer's report. Mr. King showed Col. Breland a report and explained cash, Treasury bonds, bank certificates purchased, and interest rates being received. He also stated that periodically the Board is furnished a report as to the obligations.

Col. Breland referred to five students from Blacksburg High School having received commendation from the National Merit Scholarship program in recognition of outstanding performance on national aptitude and scholarship qualifying tests. Several thousand students participated in this program. He recommended that the Superintendent of Schools write a letter of commendation to these students and urge them to pursue a college education. Mr. Stevens mentioned that three students in Christiansburg had also received the same recognition.

Mrs. Shelburne wanted to know if a child could enter the first grade before reaching age 6. Following discussion, Mr. Hale stated that a child could be accepted by the School Board before the age of 6 but State funds could not be claimed. All costs would have to be furnished from local funds.

The following bills and disbursements were approved for payment on motion by Mr. Roberts, seconded by Dr. Graybeal and passed:

The Board heard the request of Mrs. Norma Keesee to be released from her contract effective November 1, 1972, if a suitable replacement could be found.

The Board returned to open session.

Moved by Col. Breland, seconded by Mr. Dunkenberger that Mr.Boone's request be denied. Motion passed.

Moved by Dr. Graybeal, seconded by Col. Breland that Mrs. Keesee's resignation be accepted if a auitable replacement can be secured. Motion passed.
