Exordio

In the name of God Amen. I Baulser Lybrook of Montgo-
 mery County and State of Virginia being in perfect health of body and
 of sound mind and memory (thanks be to God for his mercies) do
 make and Ordain this my last will and Testament that is to say prin-
 cipally and first of all I recommend my soul to God that give it and
 my body I recommend to the Earth to be buried in decent Christian
 burial at the direction of my executors. And touching such worldly
 Estate wherewith it hath pleased God to bless me in this life. I do dispose
 of and bequeath the same in the following manner To wit. 1st I will
 and bequeath unto Catherine Lybrook my dearly beloved wife my
 dwelling house with all the household furniture the mill the meadow
 the Orchard the garden and one hour the choice of my horses and
 three cows the choice of my stock of cattle and all my logs to be born
 during her life. 2nd I will and bequeath unto my son Henry Lybrook the
 plantation on which I now live lying and being on the lower side of Sta-
 king Creek a branch of New River with its appurtenances to him and his
 heirs forever valued to him at One hundred and and twenty pounds
 3rd I will and bequeath unto my son Philip Lybrook my land lying above
 the mouth of of Stinking Creek a branch of New River with its appur-
 tenances to him and his heirs forever valued to him at the price of Eighty pounds
 4th I will and bequeath unto my son John Lybrook all the tract of land
 known by the name of the Live Run Tract with its appurtenances to him
 and his heirs forever valued to him at the price of Fifty pounds and
 also Thirty pounds to be paid him out of my personal Estate. 5th I will and
 bequeath unto my daughter Catherine Philips eighty pounds to be paid to
 her out of my personal Estate and if there be a balance for it to be equally
 divided among the whole of my children after my just debts and funeral
 expenses are paid my desire is that my son Henry Lybrook whose land is
 valued higher than those of my other children shall pay back to
 the other children their share of the said balance

and my wife doan. Lastly I do constitute and appoint my sons Henry
Philip and John Lybrook my Executors of this my last will and Testament
and I do hereby revoke and doanul all other and former wills. In
Testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand this 7th day of February
in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and thers of the
Commonwealth the twenty seventh

burn Memrod Brown are held and firmly bound unto John Page
Governor of Virginia and his Successors in the penal sum of Five
hundred dollars, to the payment whereof we bind ourselves our heirs & jointly
and severally with our hands and seals this 6th day of March 1801
The condition of the above obligation is such that whereas the
above bound Thomas Wallerson is appointed a constable for Mont
